Eramosa township council is not overly enthusiastic about having joint dog control themselves and

abutting Nichol township. At Monday evening's meeting of council, Reeve Bill Adsett read a letter from Nichol township council suggesting the joint control. Enclosed was a copy of their dog control by-law. Mr. Adsett pointed out he did not think the Nichol by-law was as "in depth" as Eramosa's.

Councillor Dave Masson said the only advantage would be services were needed in the northern end of the township, where Nichol abuts, and their dog control officer could get to the call before the Eramosa officer could arrive.

Asks amputees enter games for disabled

The Ontario Amputee Sports Association is looking for participants for the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled, which will be held in Brantford, June 17-20.

John Gibson of Georgetown, who is president of the association, feels there are many amputees living in Ontario who could compete, if they were aware of the Games. He explains that competition is between similar disabilities, i.e. a below the knee amputee only competes against another below the knee amputee. Only by participating in the Ontario Games can an individual be chosen for the Ontario Team to go to Edmonton for the Canada Games for the Physically Disabled in August.

Sports Ontario Amputee Association is a new organization whose aims and objectives are to promote competition among amputees. This will be the third year in which amputees have participated. In 1975, 11 amputees took part in Cambridge. A total of 28 took part last summer in London. However, the province was not truly represented geographically. There were two.competitors from the Hamilton-Niagara Falls area and one from London. The remainder came from Toronto and points east and north of there. In the Olympiad last summer, Ontario athletes
