Hydro considers abolishing rentals

Acton Hydro Commission may be getting out of the water heater rental business. At their monthly meeting held last Thursday, the commissioners discussed the present system of renting the heaters out to customers at a nominal fee. Chairman Wilf McEachern pointed out the costs are \$24 a year with free servicing. He explained that one service call costs more than the yearly rental fee, and they are not making any money on it.

Superintendent Mason said that people come home, do their washing and have a shower and wonder why they run out of hot water. Mr. Mason explained that they think their heaters are defective when actually they

have just used the water up faster than it can heat itself.

Thursday, Hinton called for the board to withdraw all previous motions dealing with gifted children and urged board emphasis be placed on "ensuring these students receive instruction and motivation from their classroom teachers."

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
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
