When he died, she brought the two girls back to Acton, from Regina. Wool, sewing needs, embroidery needs, patterns, baby and children's wear and small gifts have been the staples of her good quality stock over the years.

She also carried millinery for many years, when hats were a "must" for ladies. Miss Roszell used to do dressmaking herself so was particularly interested in sewing and buying sewing acces-sories for the shop. She always had a wide range of buttons, laces and ribbons and many customers found "the very thing" in her small store. She used to carry cloth flowers which were at one time used commonly; these have been completely phased out and replaced by plastic
