



1. TIMES - Registration will begin at 8:45 a.m. in all schools. Necessary afternoon sessions will begin at 1:00 p.m.

2. TAX SUPPORT - Evidence of Public School Tax Support will be required. This information is shown on your 1977 tax bill. Please bring copy of your tax bill on the day of registration. If you do not have a tax bill, special forms will be on hand for completion.

3. AGE - The child must be 5 years of age by December 31, 1977, to be eligible for enrolment for September, 1977.

4. A birth certificate or notice of birth registration will be required for proof of
