The next three columns will provide a description and brief history of three arenas in the town. This week we will look at the area's oldest and most recently renovated. The Georgetown Memorial

Arena was originally opened in 1923 and after being closed last year for eleven months for structural repairs, it was officially re-opened on December 30, 1976.

The arena contains snack bar facilities, four dressing rooms, referees room, first aid room, skate sharpening booth and equipment storage for minor hockey and figure skating. The upstairs hall which is being used as a gymnasium measures 65 feet long by 40 feet wide. The ice surface is 175 feet

long by 70 feet wide, with 600 permanent theatre type seats and the ice is supplied by a 53 ton amonia- brine refrigeration system.

The facility is open an average of 18 hours a day with approximately 4000 people per week visiting the

building. At present the arena is operating with a full schedule of Junior B hockey, figure skating, minor hockey, public skating, and casual rentals. During the summer months roller skating, ball hockey, wrestling and some special events will be offered.

The arena is located at 42 Mill Street in the Georgetown area of Halton Hills and is managed by Doug Vivian and staff Bob Paul, Randy Weldon and Steve Buck.

A reminder that the Learn to Skate, and Power Skating programs held at the Gordon Alcott Arena will be registering at the Recreation Offices during the week of March 13th, 8.30 a.m. - 4.30 p.m. The Learn to Skate program is offered to children under three right up to adults.
