We have a delightful subject to discuss today. Are you sitting comfortably? Close your eyes and project your mind. Ready? Now imagine your manure pile. I knew you'd be thrilled.

By now you're probably so sick of your manure pile you'd rather forget the whole thing. Unless, perhaps, it's buried under great snowdrifts like mine. In which case, you'll have smaller satellite piles, rather like a spider plant, thrusting their little heads above the snow in whichever direction you could stagger that day,

Of course, we all know it's very necessary to keep the pile compact and far away from the barn. If the pile gets closer and closer to the back barn door each week, by spring you'll be faced with a nasty swampy quagmire which the horses will love.

If Mack had his way, our pile would be four foot square at the bottom and twenth-three feet high - with me tripping lightly up the narrow plank runway with the day's offering. Unfortunately, bionic women though I may be, building a stalactite pile is not within my many talents.

Consequently, our compost spreads far and wide and becomes even flatter when the horses get into the barnyard and have little picnics tromping the strawy heap.

Bedding the best

Most experienced stockmen will have developed their own method of stable cleaning. But the poor old novice usually kills himself reading all those English stable management books and trying to keep his stall immaculate with every strand of straw gracefully plaited.

Phoney. In our cold climate you can get away with deep bedding and weekly cleaning very satisfactorily, unless you have a full staff, boarders paying tidy monthly sums and want to keep up appearances.

Each time you clean the box, muck out all the manure throwing the reuseable straw in one corner. When you get to the dry crumbly manure mixed with straw chaff at the bottom use this to form an absorbent bed before laying fresh straw. I even use cleanings from the chicken pens for this purpose - it's usually mostly straw anyway. This forms a kitty-litter-type bedding. Throw one or two bales of straw around shaking out well, building up the sides to keep drafts

Each day you can pick out the wet centre part in a matter of minutes. Bring more straw down from the edge and shake in a couple more flakes.

In most cases, your horse will be very comfortable until the following Saturday cleaning rolls around.

Needless to say, this method only works for animals who are out in a paddock or field all day leaving half their goodies outside and cleaning their feet with the snow. The floor of the box stall needs to be thoroughly scraped

down every month or so and a fine layer of lime sprinkled all over, to kill any bugs. Straight stalls need to be cleaned every day or the poor horse will end up standing down hill. However, a modification of the deep bedding technique can be adapted


here. Hopefully you now know all about bedding - horses, that is.
