

Church parade ends Scout-Guide week

Scout leaders felt attendance at the eighth annual church parade Sunday afternoon was down due to unfavorable weather and parents who thought the "parade" part meant trudging through ice and sleet.

"It is the first one where we haven't had a full church," noted Terry Colter, assistant district commissioner of Cubs. She said they were pleased with attendance nevertheless.

The annual church parade celebrates Scout-Guide Week in Halton Hills and is usually held in the spacious sanctuary of Holy Cross Church, Georgetown, where Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Brownies, Guides, Rangers, Venturers

and Rovers assemble in the downstairs hall and march upstairs into the sanctuary.

Clergy taking part in this year's service included Rev. R. Gallagher, St. George's Anglican Church, Georgetown; Rev. Das J. Sydney of Acton Baptist Church; Rev. Dr. Hallett E. Llewellyn of St. John's United Church, Georgetown, and host pastor Father Pierre Wood, assistant pastor of Holy Cross.

Ron Bourque led the folk choir which consisted of various members of the scouting movement from Cubs, Brownies, to Guides and Scouts. They were accompanied by guitars.

Rev. Das Sydney gave the first homily, taking the parable of the house built on

rock and developed it into a theme urging members of the scouting movement to learn to take advice.

Rev. Hallett Llewellyn gave the second homily on what freedom means to young people, either to do what they ought, or simply to use it to kick over the traces and do anything they want.

A Guide and Venturer read the Scriptures, the first from Matthew and the second from Paul's letter to the Romans. Pipe Major Mrs. Virginia Hulme played Amazing Grace on the bagpipes, an unusual feature of the service.

Another colorful part of the annual ritual was the presentation and reception of colors of the various packs, companies and troops from North Halton, at the altar.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING
PROVINCIAL SEWAGE WORKS PROGRAMME
 Ontario Township of Eramosa (Police Village of Rockwood)

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment is developing a provincially owned sewage works consisting of a sewage pumping station and pretreatment facilities and a pipeline to convey the sewage from the Police Village of Rockwood in the Township of Eramosa to the City of Guelph sanitary sewer system. The pipeline would pass through the Township of Guelph and the Township of Eramosa. The Minister of the Environment has, pursuant to Section 30 of The Environmental Assessment Act, 1975, ordered that the construction programme with respect to this proposed sewage works be exempted from the application of the said Act. This exemption was approved by Order-in-Council No. O.C. 2889/76.

The Environmental Assessment Board will conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it can make recommendations in respect of the proposed sewage works. Written and oral submissions may be made to the Board at the hearing. The Board will not consider any submissions regarding the proposal after the hearing has been closed.

The hearing will be held on Tuesday, March 15, 1977 at 11:00 o'clock in the morning, local time, in the Rockwood Town Hall, Main Street, Rockwood, Ontario.

Plans of the proposed sewage works will be available for examination and inspection during normal business hours in the office of the Clerk of the Township of Eramosa, R.R. 1, Rockwood, of the Clerk of the Township of Guelph, R. R. 5, Guelph, of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for the Police Village of Rockwood, Rockwood, and in the office of the Environmental Assessment Board, 1 St. Clair Avenue West, 5th Floor, Toronto, Ontario, M4V 1K7.
