NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING PROVINCIAL SEWAGE **WORKS PROGRAMME** Township of Eramosa

(Police Village of Rockwood)

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment is deve oping a provincially owned sewage works consisting of a sewage pumping station and pretreatment facilities and a pipeline to convey the sewage from the Police Village of Rockwood in the Township of Eramosa to the City of Guelph sanitary sewer system. The pipeline would pass through the Township of Guelph and the Township of Eramosa. The Minister of the Environment has, pursuant to Section 30 of The Environmental Assessment Act, 1975, ordered that the construction programme with respect to this proposed sewage works be exempted from the application of the said Act. This exemption was approved by Order-in-Council No. O.C. 2889/76.

The Environmental Assessment Board will conduct a public hearing to obtain information and to hear the views of the public so that it can make recommendations in respect of the proposed sewage works. Written and oral submissions may be made to the Board at the hearing. The Board will not consider any submissions regarding the proposal after the




