tising and marketing students will get a taste of free enterprise when Acton High School becomes the first of its kind in Halton to run its cafeteria.

AHS will be the first composite school to administer its cafeteria when the new building on Churchill Rd. N. opens in September.

Two Halton vocational schools-Burlington's Brock and Oakville's General Wolfe-already operate their own cafeterias.

The middle school, which will also open in the fall in the former high school building. will not have a cafeteria. Beaver Foods supplies

Roy McMillan, who chaired a committee on the school's administration, cafeteria said that one reason for the change from the usual catering service is that: "We want a cafeteria that's responsible directly to the needs." McMillan is AHS's chairman of applied science.

Profits and losses from the management of the cafeteria will return to the school body. Principal Dean Fink and Mr. McMillan both look for the cafeteria to end up in the black.

operation to that of a company. For example, if there's a \$100 debt, then the cafeteria council, which is responsible for the operation, will have to devise some means of paying it. "Exactly as some outside business", he said.

Unlike an outside company, though, the cafeteria's books will be kept by an accounting class, nutrition will be studied by home economics and advertising will be handled by the marketing class. A 12-member cafeteria
