'77 capital budget passed at \$1,657,050

A capital budget of \$1,657,050, almost the same as last year, was approved by Halton Hills council Monday night, for 1977.

In an attempt to keep debt charges to a minimum, \$688,275 will come from the normal operating budget, \$688,775 from subsidies, mainly from the Ministry of Transportation and Communication, and the Community Centres Grant, and \$16,000 from reserve fund.

This leaves \$264,000 to be debentured.

Treasurer Ray King and members of council, stressed there is no definite commitment to carry out all the items listed in the capital budget, until they have been considered one by one when the operating budget is set. Included in the \$231,500 recreation capital budget for this year is the construction of a soccer field beside George Alcott Arena in Georgetown...

and Draper, Georgetown, \$77,050; McIntyre Crescent, including Dale Gate \$126,000; Main Street, Acton, from Mill northerly to town limits \$360,000; plus miscellaneous road work \$12,700. The total road budget is \$990,550.

The installation of fuelling facilities and water supply at the central works yard is listed at \$27,000, and equipment for the works department at \$148,000.

The town plans to buy the hydro standards and lights outright, instead of renting them as they have in the past. The purchase would be paid at a yearly cost of \$10,000 for five years.

In the 1978 to '81 capital budget, which is a forecast of suggested capital expenditures only, a tank truck for Acton fire department costing \$47,000 was moved a year ahead to 1978 from 1979, since the building is planned this year.

Also in the projections for 1978 are an aerial lift for Georgetown Fire Dept., a road grader, a baseball diamond at Georgetown's Gordon Alcott arena, Acton

Prayer vital in world today

A personal appreciation of the recent Presbyterian meeting of the UCW in Guelph, was given at Rockwood UCW meeting by representative, Miss Gladys Hannah.

Using the day's agenda as background for her commentary, she noted that the speaker's message on Prayer and God's help during the worship service was superb.

"Dr. Clark MacDonald, the main speaker, asked 'Where is the Church Going?' He compared the church and the world's problems to a bow and arrow; the church is the bow but the world's problems is the string. 'Who controls whom?'

He challenged his listeners, 'It's up to the individual Christians to be the leaven, to spread the word of God to all. Legislation cannot control mankind's impulses, but each individual heart must be touched separately.'

Mrs. Jessie Dunk shared a meditation on the greatness of God and the wonder of His involvement with the personal problems of the Christians who believe He can help, as they humble themselves and pray.

"Many people today feel inadequate and guilt-ridden but they should realize that they are not inferior at all; instead they should thank God for creating them as special individuals;

each person is unique and God expects us to serve Him in our own special way. He does not compare us with anyone else as we do. He loves us as we are.

She compared life's troubles to the March stormy winds; we must be certain that God is waiting for our trusting hearts, just as we are confident that the sun is behind the clouds.

"However this knowledge and security brings a responsibility with it; we are expected to share our blessings and knowledge with others. We can help Him to wipe away the tears," she said.

Prayer Mrs. Florence Trousdale noted that the World Day of Prayer was close at hand. She chose a selection from H. Emerson Fosdick to emphasize the importance of prayer in a distraught world.

Christ is often considered to have had an easy passage through his life because of His powers, but while He lived the life of a man, He showed great courage and nobility of character. But most of all He showed us the need for prayer.

Today we should avail ourselves of the mighty power within our reach through prayer.

Mrs. Dunk read a poem on the Shield of prayer which is available to each of us; before we start each day we can be ready to cope with life's problems, if we only ask for His guidance and presence throughout our day.
