The Ellison-Pilote-McCann line accounted for all six of the Flyers tallies.
The hat trick for Pilote rounded out an excellent series for the centre who is playing the best hockey of his Junior B career.
"The boys played one hell of a series," said a sore-throated coach, Gerry Inglis after the final game.
Inglis credited the whole team but he pinpointed the emergence of the Pilote-Ellison-McCann line, the shifting of Ron Twiss to defence where he has become the team's top playmaker with seven assists, and the excellent goaltending of Vince

Fiore who was in net for the four wins against Oakville as prime reasons for the victory.
