

Better busing

Halton Board of Education hopes they will have a better communication system for parents about school busing in bad weather before school starts in September of 1977. Director of Education Em Lavender said gears are in motion for next year and should be ready by summer.

Trustee Bill Lawson said he was satisfied with procedures in the north and finds parents forget information sent out early in September's newsletter.

The subject came up at the Board on Thursday when a letter was received suggesting the chairman should be the one who decides when schools are closed due to bad weather.

Mr. Lavender said there were two occasions this year when weather was bad and conditions differed in all parts of Halton. He said the decision to close schools and stop busing was in the hands of area chairman.

Lavender said area chairmen use a number of sources for their weather information including the police, airport, radio at 6 a.m. and they try to find out the road conditions before they make a decision on whether buses should go out. The information is then relayed to all local radio stations and CFRB in Toronto.

He said difficulties arose this year on two occasions when severe conditions changed after 6 a.m. He said the administration was trying to correct procedures and communications so parents could be better informed.

Slum feared on Kingham Rd.

Halton Hills works committee treated a letter that expressed fears of Kingham Road turning into a slum, as received and filed Monday night.

The letter, from Reginald Ford, 133 Kingham Rd., is concerned with the road becoming a slum if unrestricted parking is permitted.

In his letter, dated March 16, Mr. Ford recognized the parking problem on the road but stated that unrestricted parking isn't the answer because: a) anyone wanting to work on junk cars, could park these on Kingham Rd. regardless of where they live, b) tractor trailers coming into town could use this street for overnight parking, c) trailers not in use could be left on the street, d) abandoned cars would be a menace to the safety of small children.

Named to committee

Three Acton men have been appointed to an industrial advisory committee for the Hillsburgh, John Goy, Paul Nielsen and Chamber of Commerce president Louis Charlebois.

Mr. Goy was a member of the former development commission of Acton which sought industry for the town.

Halton Hills council decided the committee should be formed and that recommendation for members should come from the Chamber of Commerce of the two areas, Acton and Georgetown. The Georgetown appointments are not final yet.

Georgetown Chamber of Commerce president George Gray met with council last week to discuss the forming of the committee. He later contacted his Acton counterparts.
