The expansion of the existing Georgetown library is out, and a new library in Cedarvale is in.

Keep old library for other use

Right after Halton Hills council voted to have plans drawn for a new library in Cedarvale park, they voted unanimously to try to retain the old library building. The motion said "we are vitally concerned that the building be preserved and

maintained to provide community services, in accordance with the policy set in existing agreements with the town and churches involved."

Council plans to hold a meeting with church representatives on the subject.

Councillor Roy Booth wondered why the town wanted it, if all the arguments advanced on the high cost of repairs were true. "If they aren't true you just made an unwise decision to build a new one."

Councillor Mike Armstrong termed the motion a "wise one". He claimed no member of council intended to do away with the building but to hold it for some other use.

Committee denies severance bid

The regional land division committee turned down an application for a severance by a cash crop farmer because the split would encourage urban development in a rural area.

Tomato farmer George Sekulovich's bid for a severance on the westerly half of Lot 22, on the Seventh Line, would have enabled him to

build another house and improve a tool shed said Peter Saxe, who accompanied Sekulovich to the meeting in the Esqueping Township Building on March 22.

Sekulovich, who's owned the land for 10 years, harvested a crop last year valued at about \$2,500, Saxe told the committee. The land's potential agricultural value is

Indian crafts outlet in home

It is just about six years since Margaret Brillinger began selling Indian crafts from her home at 4 Park Ave. on a non-profit basis. In that time she has done "thousands of dollars worth" of business.

The money is given to Indian craftsmen in the areas of Kasbonika and Big Trout Lake, 200 miles north of the railroad lines, where the goods are made. Because of the inaccessible nature of the area the only way in and out is by bush plane, according to Mrs. Brillinger.

Mrs. Brillinger first became involved in selling these crafts in Guelph. "We had

two high school students living with us at the time, and they got us our contacts."

All different Most of the goods which the Indians make are leather and beadercraft. Because there are many different people making things, each item is different, says Mrs. Brillinger. Occasionally they make moccasins and mukluks.

There is a high expense associated with the use of a plane, but "when you think of the hours they put in, they're not making much for their time," says Mrs. Brillinger about the Indians.

Reject resolution

Halton Hills council rejected a Brampton and District Labor Council resolution to ask the province to withdraw its support from the wage and price control program, Tuesday night, on a seven to five vote.

Voting for the resolution were Councillors Russ Miller, Pete Pomeroy, Pat McKenzie, Marilyn Serjeantson, and Mayor Tom Hill.

Opposing the withdrawal resolution were Councillors Les Duly, Roy Booth, Peter Morris, Peter Marks, Mike

Armstrong, Walter Biehn and George Malby.

The resolution was brought back at Pomeroy's insistence, after it was tabled with little discussion the previous night.

Pomeroy contended the labor representatives had left "with a bad taste in their mouths" Monday night, and felt they had been brushed off. "We owe the working people of the town an answer".
