

## Halton Hills Recreation and Parks News and Views

Acton Lions Pool was built in 1974 and opened in November of the same year. It was funded by the Lions Club of Acton, the School Board, a community centres grant and by the taxpayers of the town of Acton and the town of Halton Hills.

The pool is located in the high school on Acton Boulevard. It is 25 metres long, three feet, six inches deep in the shallow end and 12 feet, six inches deep in the deep end.

The deep end of the pool is equipped with both a one and three metre diving board. There are change rooms, showers and two saunas, one in each change room.

The pool has almost maximum use, with the Board of Education scheduling it during the day and the recreation department during the evenings, weekends and holidays.

The recreation department provides a wide variety of programs, including Red Cross Water Safety and Royal Life Saving Society, as well

as diving, synchronized swimming, competitive swimming and ladies aquatics. These programs welcome swimmers of all ages. This spring, there will also be a ladies' swim and trim class started.

The pool supervisor is Elizabeth Binsfeld. Elizabeth came to Halton Hills in September 1976 after graduating from Seneca College's recreation facility management course in the spring. Previously she had been employed in aquatics with the Borough of York in Toronto and the Toronto Board of Education. She now resides in Acton.

The aquatic staff are presently planning the summer programs and are very anxious to hear from you if you have any ideas that you would like to see materialize.

## Tennis fees going up

Tennis enthusiasts will pay more to play at Gordon Alcott and Acton tennis clubs, if a recommendation from finance-administration committee is adopted by council.

Rates for a family at Gordon Alcott club will rise from \$17 last year to \$28 this year, and at Acton Tennis Club from \$17 last year to \$20 this year.

The adult rate at Alcott club will go from \$9.50 to \$12.50 and at Acton club from \$9 to \$11.

The rate for juniors will remain at \$5 for Alcott Club and will increase from \$2.50 to \$5 at Acton. At the Acton Club there has been an intermediate rate, but this year it will disappear.

Karen King, Recreation Coordinator, said this increased rate would just cover expenses, since last year Gordon Alcott club had a deficit of \$1,400, because fees were not high enough.

Councillor Peter Marks pointed out a family membership at the indoor pools cost \$70, so didn't feel this amount was out of line.

Councillor Roy Booth termed the increase at Gordon Alcott club, "A whopping big one."

Crandall Murray, treasurer of Gordon Alcott Club, in attendance with John Dallison, president, emphasized the club wanted to keep the junior membership

low, to encourage young people to play. He said adults usually play much more frequently than young people so should absorb any increase. He explained two dollars of the fee goes to the Halton Hills Tennis Association.

Councillor Peter Marks wondered if the fee increase would reduce membership. Mr. Murray said the club didn't feel it would.
