The spring choir rally is to be held on April 24.

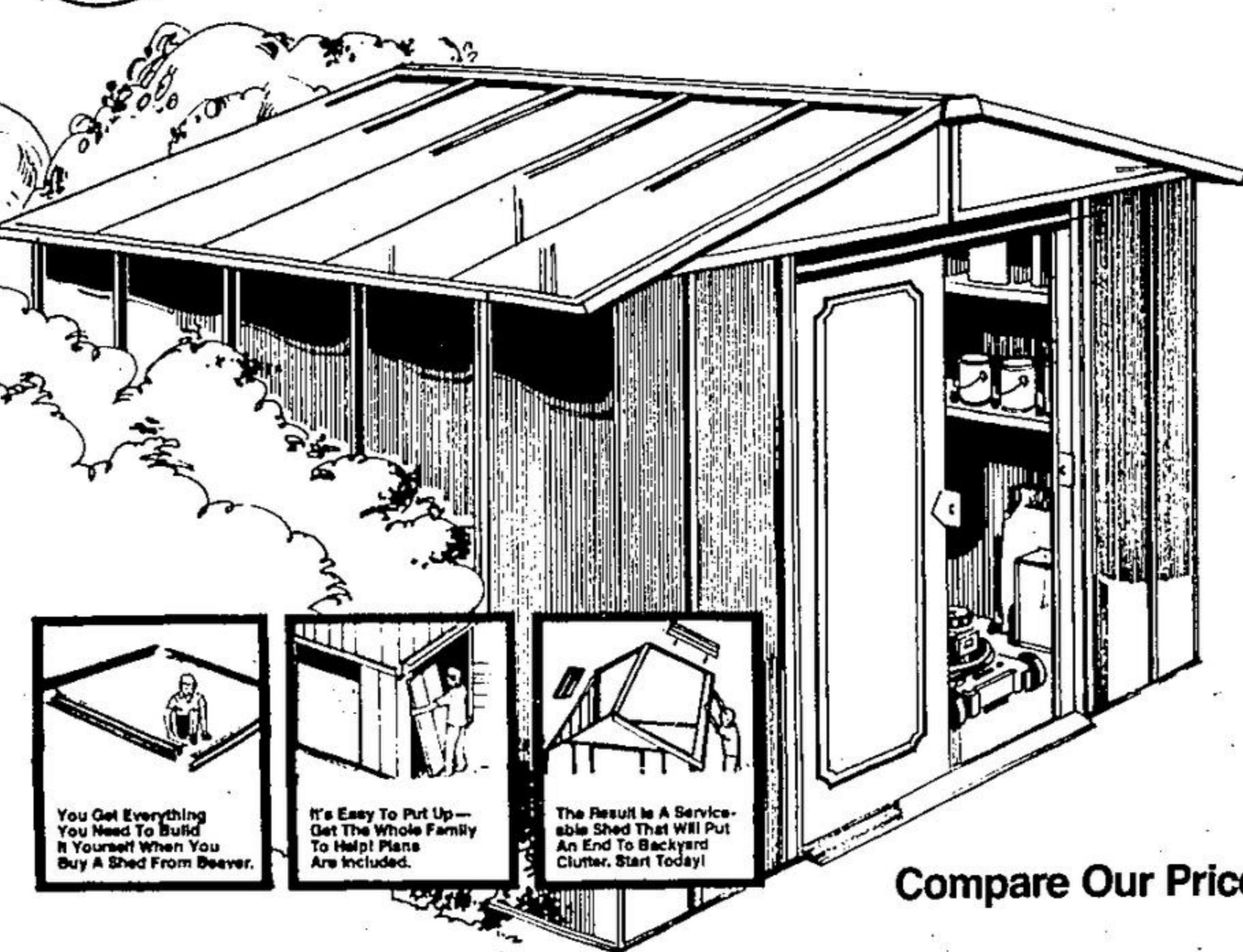
Mr. Carl Cargill is a patient in hospital.

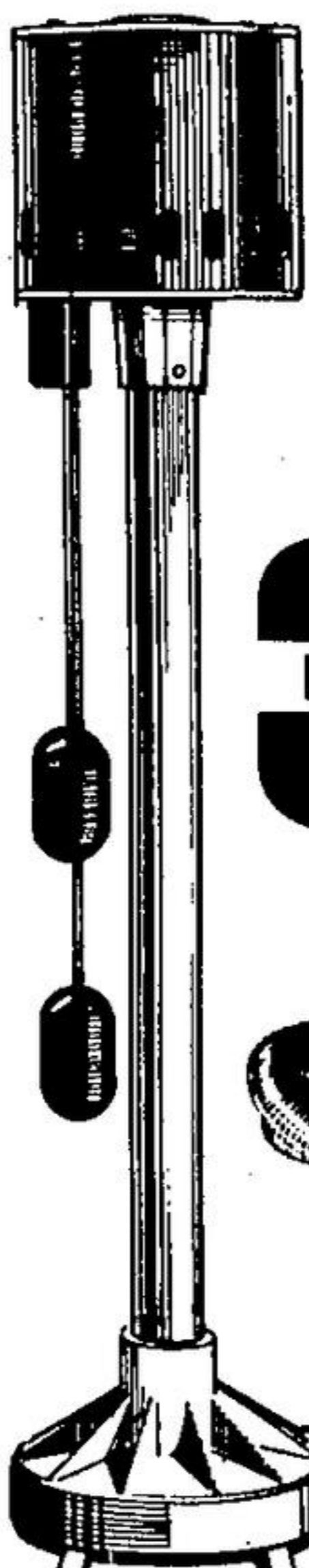

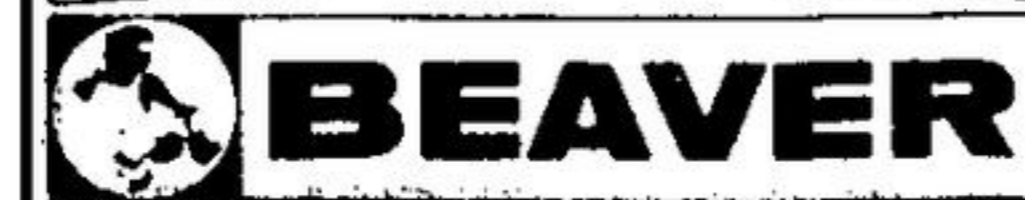
