**Johnson gives opening speech**

Jack Johnson, M.P.P., Wellington-Dufferin-Peel, gave the opening speech for the government in the debate on the speech from the throne.

Commitment During his speech, Mr. Johnson spoke of the government's commitment to people. **Seven per cent raise**

Seven per cent pay increases were approved for 172 office, clerical and technical employees of Halton Region by the Region's Administration Committee.

The adjustment is comparable to that settlement awarded to the members of IBEW. Outside workers at the region are represented by that union.

In a report to the committee, Personnel Director Dennis Camm said the region was restrained in what it could offer by the Anti-Inflation Guidelines but he felt the rates being paid were competitive.

Raises of six and seven per cent were also awarded to people in management and supervisory positions. Ceilings of \$1,600 were put on increases for positions.

During the same meeting the committee approved a suggestion by Mr. Camm that would provide for a reproduction of the coat of arms as well as a gift worth about \$25 upon retirement.

**Police association points safety issue to brass**

A bid by the regional police association to have the police governing body listen to its concerns for officers' safety has been directed to the staff.

Halton Regional Police Commission chairman William Hourigan, Monday, suggested to police association president Allen Ruelens that he take his concerns about new zones and officer safety to senior officers.

Ruelens told the commission he thought he had

tried going through high ranking officers when the association asked for a meeting with Chief Ken Skerrett two months ago. No date was set, Ruelens said.

Perhaps there was a breakdown in communications, Hourigan said.

The seriousness here is the safety of the man in a hundred square miles, Ruelens said.

April 1, Halton's force took over responsibility for policing the entire region. Until then the Ontario Provincial Police covered parts of the west, such as Mohawk Raceway.

Milton has been reduced from a two man area to a one man area, Ruelens said. Communications centre is concerned with the spread of the zones, said the association president.

One commission member, Judge William Warrender, said that he did not understand the significance of Ruelens' statements. He asked why the issue had not been brought before superior officers.

We are concerned response time to a call will almost double, and the distance between officers will be doubled, Ruelens said.

**Region seeks more control**

Halton Regional Council should have more control over autonomous and semi-autonomous boards and commissions in the region, according to members of the council's Bill 151 Review Committee.

Regional Chairman Ric Morrow told the committee at a meeting Friday that he wanted the committee to investigate the prospect of making the Children's Aid Society a Department of the Region.

Regional Council and the autonomous Children's Aid Board of Directors seem to be headed for a confrontation over the proposed CAS budget. The budget calls for a 60 per cent increase.

Mr. Morrow said he was disturbed to learn that the CAS wanted to hire its own accountant. He felt there was duplication being created that wouldn't be necessary if the CAS was considered a department of the region instead of an independent body.

Mr. Morrow said that legislation should be tightened up to give council more control over the Board of Health. Milton Councillor Jim Watson echoed Morrow's sentiment concerning the possibility of the region's expanding role.

He suggested the CAS, Police Department and Conservation Authority should all be under the direct control of the region. "I can see where one is taken in and the other is not," he said.

Chairman Morrow said the province would eventually turn over its responsibility for planning control to the region.

He said he looked forward to the day when there would be no interference on planning matters from the province. "Local control is what we want and local control is what we are getting," he said.

Mr. Morrow angered CAS directors and members when he used the CAS annual meeting as a forum to scold the Society for its proposed 60 per cent budget increase.

That appears to be the first in a series of confrontations the Region and the CAS will have.

The Region's Community Service Committee has said it will hold a special in-camera meeting to deal with personnel problems at the CAS and the proposed budget.

While the CAS is the organization most often in the headlines these days, the committee reviewing Bill 151 doesn't limit its plans for greater control to that body.

The committee agreed that legislation should be changed to strip the Board of Health of its autonomy.

As it stands, there are two provincial appointees and several regional councillors on the Board of Health. While the problem has never presented itself, it is possible that the Board of Health could push a program without the majority support of the council.

While the board membership is weighted heavily in favor of the council, it does represent a minority.

Unlike the planning, public works or administration committees it does not have to report to council. It does so now as a courtesy. But legally the council could not overrule
