New Hamburg minced Atoms take trophy in W-W consolation

Acton major atoms eliminated New Hamburg in two games to bring the Wellington-Waterloo consolation trophy to Acton this year. The atoms beat New Hamburg 3-2 in New Hamburg and then came back to win it in front of the home crowd by a 4-1 count.

In the first game, played March 27, New Hamburg was first on the scoreboard when Greg Snyder found the mark from Bill Gilmore to take a 1-0 lead.

It was the last lead they had in the series, as Acton came right back with three in a row to take the lead. Vince Danagher was the first marksman for the winners, converting a Paul Cargill pass for the point.

From faceoff Steven Raine opened the second frame with a quick goal off the faceoff, taking a pass from Ian Vanitem and popping it in.

Raine poured in the winner in the third frame on a pass from David McKnight to run the score to 3-1. New Hamburg pulled within one on a Kevin Clements effort, but were unable to catch up to the hustling Acton team.

The boys wrapped up the series back home on March 29, skating past New Hamburg 4-1 for the title. Acton jumped ahead to a 2-0 lead in the opening frame on the strength of an unassisted marker from Jim Richard

Evans connects again Raiders champions

A shorthanded, unassisted goal by Ray Evans at 3:28 of the second 20 minute overtime period gave Georgetown Chrysler Raiders a 6-5 win over the Fort Erie Mavericks, Sunday night, bringing Georgetown its eighth OHA intermediate hockey championship.

Raiders will now host the NOHA champion Timmins North Stars in the Eastern Canadian Intermediate "A" quarter-finals for the Hardy Cup in a best of three series at Georgetown, this weekend. The teams will play at Alcott Arena, Friday night at 8:30, Saturday night at 7:30 and, if necessary, Sunday afternoon at 2:30.

The Hardy Cup is the intermediate category's answer to the Memorial and Allan Cups, with teams from across the country competing in best of three series until the final weekend of April when the championship series will be played.

If Raiders beat Timmins, they'll play host to either the Embrun Panthers, of the Ottawa District Hockey Association or Val D'Or Voodoos from Quebec in the Eastern Canadian semi-finals the following weekend. Panthers, who have several ex-WHA players in their lineup, are the defending Hardy Cup champions.

Evans stole the puck behind the Fort Erie net, brought it around and jammed it past a surprised Maverick goalie Rich Walpole, as 1100 happy Georgetown fans raised the roof. Evans also scored in overtime to give the Raiders a 9-8 win in the series opener. Fort Erie won the second game 4-2 on home ice, but Raiders took the third and fourth games by 3-2 and 5-4 scores. Bill Currie scored the important tying goal in Friday night's 5-4 win before a crowd of 1028 in Georgetown.

Winger Doug Tate, who played with Tom Watt's U of T Blues in 1973, scored seven goals for Georgetown in the five game final series, including three in Sunday's 6-5 championship clincher. Danny Blair, Pat O'Banion and Owen Held combined to score 17 of the 23 Fort Erie goals in the series.

The championship victory climaxed a remarkable climb back to the top for the Raiders, who were caught cheating and suspended from competition just before playoff time in 1975. Last year, Georgetown pushed Port Colborne to seven games, before losing in the OHA final.

Raiders won their first OHA Intermediate "A" championship in 1948. They were also Intermediate "A" champs in 1957, 1972, 1973 and 1974. Raider clubs copped the Intermediate "B" crown in 1950 and 1959.
