

# Plan changes already for Rockmosa centre

Even though the new community centre in Rockmosa Park, Rockwood, is not yet completed, already changes have been planned. Rockwood and District Lions Club members Walter Swanston and Harry Bonner attended Eramosa township

council meeting Monday evening to ask for additions to the centre to accommodate kitchen equipment and washrooms, and improve hydro and plumbing facilities, and possibly erect a stage. The men explained the additional costs would be paid by the

club and by grants. Council members said they felt some of the additions should have been included in the original contract, but went ahead and signed a resolution to execute an addition to the original contract with Wm. Parker Construction up to \$25,546. The final amount will be determined after the engineer has checked all the items and deducted any items which were included in the original contract.

The township will also apply for grants from the Ministry of Culture and Recreation and Wintario.

The meet was open to wrestlers outside of Canada and at least 500 men under the age of 21, many from United States, competed. In his final match against the wrestler who defeated

him last spring for a spot on Canada's olympic team, Doug scored 22-2. Coach Frank Corning from Centre Wellington district high school felt it was one of the best national championships he had seen. There were over 1000 matches conducted in the meet.

Doug will compete for Canada in the world junior championship in Las Vegas this summer.
