For several years, the recreation department has been receiving citizens' input on recreation from the citizens of Wards 3 and 4 (Georgetown) who have been appointed by council to sit on a recreation advisory committee. The mandate which they work with is as follows:
1) To provide input in the development of philosophies, procedures, policies and priorities of the recreation and parks department.
2) To examine and comment upon sub-division plans with regard to recreation.
3) To initiate new development, particularly those in under-developed areas owned by the town (ie-bike paths, hiking trails).
4) To act as consultants where it relates to matters such as the naming of parks and facilities, etc.

5) To be instrumental in ensuring that facilities are used effectively.
6) To have the opportunity to examine programs offered by the recreation department.
7) To evaluate recreation programs.
8) To initiate, research, and carry out specific projects in identified areas of community need.
9) To convey to council, problems brought to the committee's attention to provide input to council via the recreation and parks department.

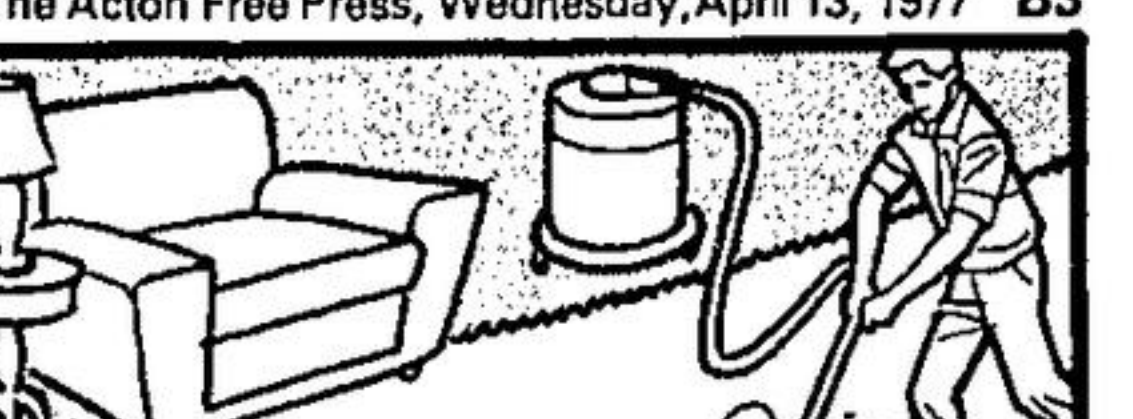
