Halton doctors are placing an increasing number of new born babies in homes and bypassing the waiting list of people who want to adopt babies, according to the Director of the Children's Aid Society, Ron Coupland.

Mr. Coupland said there are over 100 babies placed that way each year in order to short circuit the waiting list that parents would face if they went through the CAS.

That caused councillor Pat McKenzie to ask if doctors were charging an under-thetable fee to the parents adopt-

His question drew a sharp no comment from Mr. Coupland. Questioned by reporters later Mr. Coupland said the prospect of doctors charging fees for providing children is something that always exists but he said he had no concrete information on which those charges could be supported.


