Milton's Public Works Department may have to haul garbage to Burlington instead of Halton Hills if a motion going to Regional Council is eventually approved.

Halton Hills Councillor Russ Miller told the Regional Public Works Committee Wednesday that he feared the Georgetown dump would fill up before a new landfill site is acquired and Halton Hills would end up hauling from one end of the region to the other. He said the haulage costs would be very expensive.

There is only one year left in the Georgetown landfill site now according to engineer Don Morrier.

UFO base in Halton?

According to a Niagara Falls man, there's a base for unidentified flying objects (UFOs) just off the Halton shoreline of Lake Ontario.

Proof, says Malcolm Williams, 29, is in the map library at the University of Toronto where there are infra-red (heat sensing) satellite photographs of Great Lakes. Williams, who once belonged to the Royal Astronomical Association, bases his belief in UFOs on three points:

In the book Invisible Residence, Irving T. Sanderson describes a base located at the bottom of one of the Great Lakes near a spot whose description is "exactly like" Futtlesnake Point near Milton and the escarpment around Hamilton.

Williams says UFOs are attracted to high-voltage hydro installations and points out the hydro corridor through Burlington and the Lakeview generating station (Lakeshore and Dixie Road) would be a great attraction for them.

He says there is a large force field around the generating station which

could be attracting UFOs like flies to sugar.

But Williams feels his most credible evidence is in the sightings recorded on film of strange lights over Lake Ontario between Oakville and Toronto. He says the lights are entirely different from aircraft lights which were observed flying at the same time.

He is supported in this view by Harry Picken, an aeronautical engineer, pilot and president of (Genair) Ltd., an aircraft research firm from St. Catharines. His home at Niagara-on-the-Lake overlooks the lake and he says he has been watching the lights for years. He claims they do not resemble the lights from aircraft.

Picken says the lights fly in erratic patterns and make square turns conventional aircraft could not accomplish. Sometimes, they hover in one spot for up to half an hour and then go straight up.

The lights are usually orange, a color which indicates a high sodium content in the light source, never used in aircraft lights.

More French for students

Halton Board of Education will be examining proposals for a revamped French program in the not too distant future.

Superintendent of Program Bruce Mather outlined the new Ministry of Education policy which is expected to encourage boards through grants and other incentives to increase the number of French courses available and broaden the depth of French programs taught.

Queen's Park wants to increase the basic knowledge of French for all pupils along with the opportunity for some to become bilingual and increase their appreciation of French-Canadian culture.

The province hopes to achieve this by increasing grants, developing new cur-

riculum guidelines, distributing good French teaching materials used by some boards to all boards, and stimulate the development of new material.

Grants will also be increased to turn vacant classrooms into French learning centres.
