

AHOP/HOME (Assisted Home Ownership Program/ Home Ownership Made Easy Plan) is a federalprovincial program designed to bring home ownership within the reach of moderate and lower income families by offering financial aid in the form of loans, subsidies and grants. How much aid you receive depends upon your household formation, income and the monthly carrying charges for your new home.

All types of new houses are eligible for assistance as long as they are AHOP qualified by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and are sold within the maximum AHOP prices in your municipality.

Through an AHOP Interest Reduction Loan, the first year's mortgage payments are reduced to an 8% interest rate. An AHOP subsidy of up to \$750 is available during the first year of occupancy so you would not spend more than 25% of your household income on mortgage payments and municipal taxes. You may also qualify for a Provincial HOME Grant of up to \$750 in the first year should your mortgage

and tax payments still exceed 30% of your household income. Subsidies and grants are not repayable. Loan repayments begin in the seventh year of the mortgage.

Until the Spring of 1975, only two tennis courts existed in the Town of Halton Hills, to serve a population of better than 32,000. In a period of approximately six months (Spring-Fall, 1975) nine new tennis courts were developed in the Town to better handle the large numbers who were becoming interested in the sport of tennis.

At the present time there are four court locations: Gordon Alcott Tennis Club

Acton Tennis Club (3). Joseph Gibbons (2). Emmerson Park (2).

To help monitor tennis in Town, a Halton Hills Tennis Association was established. The executive consists of two representatives from each of the four member clubs. Meetings are held once a month

from February to November. Purpose of this association is to:

a) co-ordinate the activities of tennis in the Town. b) encourage inter club competition-by providing and regulating Town Wide Tournaments.

c) provide players and coaches clinics. d) promote a friendly and social atmosphere among

Clubs. e) provide input and submit recommendations towards the development of tennis facilities in Halton Hills.

f) liaison with the Town of Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department and other associated organizations.

The president of the Halton Hills Tennis Association for the 1977 season is John Dallison of the Gordon Alcott Tennis Club. Other Executive members include.

longer be operating the courts at Emmerson Park or Joseph Gibbons. Instead the courts will be under the authority of the Halton Hills Tennis Association and Recreation Department with a liaison to the community through the persons listed above.

Membership for clubs are being accepted now. Membership forms will be available at area recreation offices or the various clubs. It should be noted at this time. that each Club is required to alot 25 per cent of court playing time to public use. Therefore it is possible to play without becoming a member.

Anyone 18 years of age or over who joins a tennis club in town pays \$1 to the Halton Hills Tennis Association. This money is spent to help develop this sport. Last year a successful tournament was held in August, and it is in the plans of the executive of the Halton Hills Tennis Association this year, that this tournament will be continued this summer.
