For my next column, I promise to write about the country and our life here, answering all the questions I've been asked, but not today. Tonight Gord and I are celebrating our 20th wedding anniversary, and to lead up to that, we might go out and climb Buck Mountain this afternoon.

So what I'll do, is revert to the original reason for this column, dig out some recipes from my "Painted Recipe Box" and tell you of dishes I've cooked since heading west.

Meals are somewhat different here. For one thing, the family schedule isn't the same and I still haven't got used to a husband that is farming at home, instead of coming home from a factory at 4.30. Number two son David gets in from school 15 miles away at 4.30; but number one son, Jim, is now apprenticing as a mechanic and doesn't pull in the drive till 6.30.

What all that means, is that we have a lot of salads throughout the week, or things that will keep from the time Gord starts getting hungry (around 4) till 7 or so, if Jim's late.


The groceries available are somewhat different. We don't have all the lovely mushrooms that we did in Acton, but because we're so close to the Okanagan Valley (and to California) there's a good supply of fruit in the stores, and excellent broccoli and lettuce, all year round. The spinach from New Zealand is sour and coarse, and very different from what we bought at Acton. Anyhow, here are a few 9x12 casserole. recipes.

LEFTOVER CASSEROLE

Mix 2 cups diced cooked meat, 2 cups cooked vegetables, 2 minced onions, 1 (10 oz.) can vegetable soup, 1 can water, (broth or vegetable juice), 2 tomatoes, seasoning to taste.

Pour into large casserole and cover with 2 cups potatoes mashed without milk. Brush with butter.

Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for one hour. Serves 5. Note: Since this is a thin gravy, you might like to thicken it.




