

The Acton Minor Hockey Association has been kept or. tenterhooks for more than a week now as the OMHA decided on whether the team will be allowed to play competitive hockey next year in the W-W's or get stomped by

the larger teams in the Tri-county league. The cost efficiency analysis of the situation would show that Acton is better off in the Tri-County league, where trael costs will be lower and action will be more localized, but a cost-benefit doesn't quite measure up to the importance of giving young hockey players the chance to play competitive hockey. Sending Acton, a BB team, against a whole slew of AA teams will not do a whole lot to promote good hockey. All it can do is discourage a bunch of boys who want to play, and that counts more than any. cost-benefit malarky ever will.
