Halton Hills Recreation and Parks News and Views

Comments from both smokers and non-smokers concerning the possibility of eliminating and/or restricting smoking in enclosed public recreation areas (community centres, arenas, pools) have been received over the last few months. Members of council are also concerned and have requested that the recreation and parks department prepare a report concerning this area with suggestions on how to regulate and control smoking in enclosed public recreation areas. To quote from an article in a recent issue of the Non-Smokers Rights Association magazine, "A survey, recently completed by the U.S. Public Health Service, Adult Use of Tobacco-1975, gives a big lift to the Non-Smokers Rights movement. Perhaps the most dramatic, and to some surprising, aspect of the survey was the strong support even among smokers for the protection of non-smokers from the effects of ambient cigarette smoke. Thus, 70 per cent of all persons surveyed agreed that the smoking of cigarettes should be allowed in fewer places than it is now. For the first time, a majority of current smokers (51 per cent) agreed with that sentiment. As the report noted, this means that more than half the smokers at the present time would like to see smoking allowed in fewer places than it is now, despite the fact there are more and more restrictions on places where people are allowed to smoke."
