Board of Health backs nursing home

Halton Board of Health are solidly behind the building of 100 bed nursing home, next to Georgetown hospital.

This week, on a motion by Roy Booth and Terry Mannell, the board endorsed the nursing home unanimously. The motion be be sent to Halton Health Council for their endorsement, and if approved, will go on to the Ontario Cabinet.

According to Board of Health Chairman George Gray, there is cabinet freeze on new nursing bed licences, so an attempt will be made to have the freeze lifted for this one, since there is no nursing home in this area.

He said the local United Senior Citizens group, headed by Norm Smith, is conducting a petition for nursing home beds here.

Mr. Gray said the freeze on nursing home licences is an attempt by the province to hold down health care costs three times more than nursing home care.

Transportation is provided to Tinker Bell Nursery School from all areas in North Halton (Acton, Georgetown; Norval, Milton, Campbellville and all surrounding rural areas).

How Does Your Child Grow?

Every child grows and develops at his or her individual pace. However if you feel your child seems to lag in some area of development perhaps, the stimulating educational and enjoyable program of Tinker Bell Nursery is for

Who Comes to Tinker Bell? Tinker Bell while primarily in operation for mentally handicapped children also considers others with a vareity of disabilities. These may be (1) speech communication difficulties, (2) motor problems-result of accidents, spinal bifida, cerebral palsy, etc. (3) vision or hearing handicaps (4) epilepsy, meningitis, etc. (5) Hyperactivity, social, emotional, behavioural difficulties, (6) Downs syndrome and other genetic abnormalities, (7) environmental deprivation.

Who recommends a child to Tinker Bell?

Many services and people are aware of Tinker Bell and the advantages the program can offer some children; (1) Family physician or pediatrician, (2) Sick Children's Hospital, (3) Crippled Children's Centre, (4) Public Health Nurses, (5) Pre-Kindergarten check-up results, (6) therapists, (7) other nursery schools, (8) concerned parents and friends. .

Scheck RURAL RESIDENT?

If you live in a rural area, and are qualified to vote, it will be much easier for you to vote on Election Day if your name is on the List of Voters. However, qualified rural voters, not on the list before Election Day. may still get on the list and vote by having a triend or neighbour on the same polfing subdivision list "vouch" for them on Oath at the polling place.
