10 per cent increase in '77 education costs

Board of Education's official expenditure budget for 1977 will be a 9.9 per cent increase over the previous year. The total expenditure will be \$38,105,000. The residential mill rates for Elementary and Secondary schools go from 107.5 in 1976 to 111.22 in 1977, which is an increase of

3.7 per cent. Various deputations came before Erin Township Council Monday night, making a lengthy session.

Property Peter Vance of Waterdown and Don Robertson, solicitors representing the owners of the Huxley property on Main street, north of Hillsburgh, asked council to consider exempting the two lots from the zoning by-law. In 1895 the south parcel was conveyed away from the north part, and by 1939 were owned by the two Huxley brothers who were taxed separately. In 1973 when one lot was conveyed to Mr. May, the legal description erroneously read

as the whole property. Under the present zoning by-law these parcels do not comply with the zoning bylaw. The description was faulty, Huxleys having retained the one lot. Their request will be taken to Hungerford, the township solicitor.
