## Approve 20 per cent hike in region budget

Regional Council approved a \$33,017,440 operating budget Wednesday but only after long and often heated debates that sometimes featured bitter personal attacks.

The approved budget represents an increase of 20.9 per cent over last year's budget. Several councillors went to the meeting armed with resolutions and amendments aimed at reducing the estimates but after almost six hours of debate on the budget, council had pumped in more than they had managed to

"We face a 20.9 per cent increase and I don't think that in all conscience we can approve it. We've taken on no new responsibility and the increase far exceeds our rate growth. The increase should reflect the rate of inflation and the growth ratesmore closely," he said.
