

There was a full moon last night, did you hear me howling? Just for a lark (of course), we're going to plant our garden by the moon this year. I'm sure it won't make any difference to the crops, there are so many other variables. But It's like the man who worships at many churches in case one of them is right.

Wexing or waning

I've spent the last week planning the sizeable vegetable garden with an eye to the moon, companion crops, and natural pest reducers.

If you're interested, a general rule of thumb is to plant underground crops as the moon is waning and above ground as the moon waxes.

This month the full moon fell on May 5, will be full again May 30, and will be at its smallest on June 16.

We're planting potatoes, carrots, beets, radishes, and green onions before June 16 and all else after that date. The only exceptions are peas and beans which benefit from planting on a waning moon; and spanish onion transplants which do well planted with a waxing moon.

Venus flytraps, anyone Most people are aware that marigolds and nasturtiums bordering the garden inhibit insect damage. But did you know morning glories are good for corn? Pigweed is one of the best weeds for pumping nutrients from the subsoil? Lambs quarters helps all crops especially corn? Garile is good for raspberries-in the garden, that is. The list can go on forever. Herbs are particurlary beneficial planted here and there.

You have to be careful where you plant differnt crops, too. Beans hate onlons and garlic, but love potatoes. Beets, on the other hand, love onlons, but aren't to fond of beans. Pumpkins like corn, plated among the corn hills, but they fight with pointoes. Carrots are benefitted by tomatoes, leeks, beans, cauli-

flowers and cabbage but hate dill. Lettuce loves everything. Peas don't like onions, garlle, or potatoes; but positively dote on carrots, turnips, radishes, cucumbers, corn, beans, and This list goes on forever, too.

I don't know about you, but I'll probably plant the garden very carefully according to my charts, the moon, and the weather. I'll chant druid prayers among the corn at midnight. I'll dance naked through the potatoes. And then sit and watch the whole thing shrivel in a record-breaking drought.




The mayor said he would like to see the town hall and post office building declared historical buildings, right away. Councillor Brad Clements suggested the Act could work to the town's advantage too.
