There was a full moon last night, did you hear me howling? Just for a lark (of course), we're going to plant our garden by the moon this year. I'm sure it won't make any difference to the crops, there are so many other variables. But it's like the man who worships at many churches in case one of them is right.

**Waxing or waning**  
I've spent the last week planning the sizeable vegetable garden with an eye to the moon, companion crops, and natural pest reducers.

If you're interested, a general rule of thumb is to plant underground crops as the moon is waning and above ground as the moon waxes.

This month the full moon fell on May 5, will be full again May 30, and will be at its smallest on June 16.

We're planting potatoes, carrots, beets, radishes, and green onions before June 16 and all else after that date. The only exceptions are peas and beans which benefit from planting on a waning moon; and spanish onion transplants which do well planted with a waxing moon.

**Venus flytraps, anyone**  
Most people are aware that marigolds and nasturtiums bordering the garden inhibit insect damage. But did you know morning glories are good for corn? Pigweed is one of the best weeds for pumping nutrients from the soil? Lambs quarters helps all crops especially corn? Garlic is good for raspberries—in the garden, that is. The list can go on forever.

Herbs are particularly beneficial planted here and there. You have to be careful where you plant different crops, too. Beans hate onions and garlic, but love potatoes. Beets, on the other hand, love onions, but aren't fond of beans. Pumpkins like corn, planted among the corn hills, but they fight with potatoes.

Carrots are benefitted by tomatoes, leeks, beans, cauliflowers and cabbage but hate dill. Lettuce loves everything. Peas don't like onions, garlic, or potatoes; but positively dote on carrots, turnips, radishes, cucumbers, corn, beans, and herbs.

This list goes on forever, too. I don't know about you, but I'll probably plant the garden very carefully according to my charts, the moon, and the weather. I'll chant druid prayers among the corn at midnight. I'll dance naked through the potatoes. And then sit and watch the whole thing shrivel in a record-breaking drought.

## Can preserve old buildings

A suggestion that Milton Council take advantage of the power it has under the Ontario Heritage Act, was passed on from council to the town's newly formed Historical Society when it appeared on the council agenda Monday.

Mayor Gordon felt the Historical Society should be notified, but Councillor

Russell Powadick warned the Act has veto powers and warned council such a group could "make the whole downtown a museum."

The mayor said he would like to see the town hall and post office building declared historical buildings, right away. Councillor Brad Clements suggested the Act could work to the town's advantage too.

But Councillor Rick Day warned the Act is very strong and you cannot destroy or add onto any designated building. Council is already on record as opposing any more laws which restrict what a property owner can do with his or her property, he reminded members. "You have to be very careful."

"I hope our local heritage group doesn't go over this," he added.

## 'Throw the clown out' Barrett tells Morrow

Tempers flared frequently during Halton Regional Council's budget meeting Wednesday afternoon in Burlington.

Public Works Chairman Jack Raftis found himself in the middle of angry exchanges throughout the meeting.

At one point when Mr. Raftis had continually interrupted Mayor Don Gordon and other speakers Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett jumped to his feet and asked Chairman Ric Morrow to throw him out.

"Throw the clown out of here. I'm sick and tired of it and if you need police assistance we can get it," Barrett shouted. Mr. Barrett is a Halton Regional Police Commissioner.

Chairman Morrow warned that there is provision in the procedural by-law to have a member ejected but he noted it had never been used yet. "Yea, but they censured me in 1974," Raftis said.

laughing at the row he had started.

A short while later Raftis spoke out of turn and told councillors to watch how Burlington Alderman Ben Ciprietti voted.

"He'll vote against this one because Mary (Mayor Mary Munro) did."

Mrs. Munro complained about the latitude chairman Morrow was allowing with Raftis. "No one else makes personal remarks. If you don't sit on him—"

"Don't sit on him, hammer him," Barrett interjected. "I'd like to," Morrow said.

Later during the same meeting Burlington Councillor Tom Sutherland urged dramatic cuts in the planning department budget. Mrs. Munro countered Sutherland's remarks in a sarcastic reply. "I'm fully aware of Mr. Sutherland's many and disparate interests in land use planning but they are not evidenced by his attendance

at public meetings and open houses," she said.

Oakville Councillor Archie Donaghey took the opportunity for a dig at Sutherland. "His comments are typical of the Las Vegas, New Orleans gang to say someone else is spending too much."

Sutherland and some other councillors attended public works conventions in New Orleans and Las Vegas during the first term of council.

At this point Oakville Councillor Ron Planche demanded Morrow put an end to the personal comments. By this time the chairman was in a fit of laughter and told Planche he was enjoying the exchange so much, he couldn't stop it.

"Yea, Mr. Chairman throw Mary out and throw Ciprietti out with her," Raftis shouted, causing more laughter. Throughout the meeting Morrow ignored requests that he be an impartial chairman and took part throughout the debate.

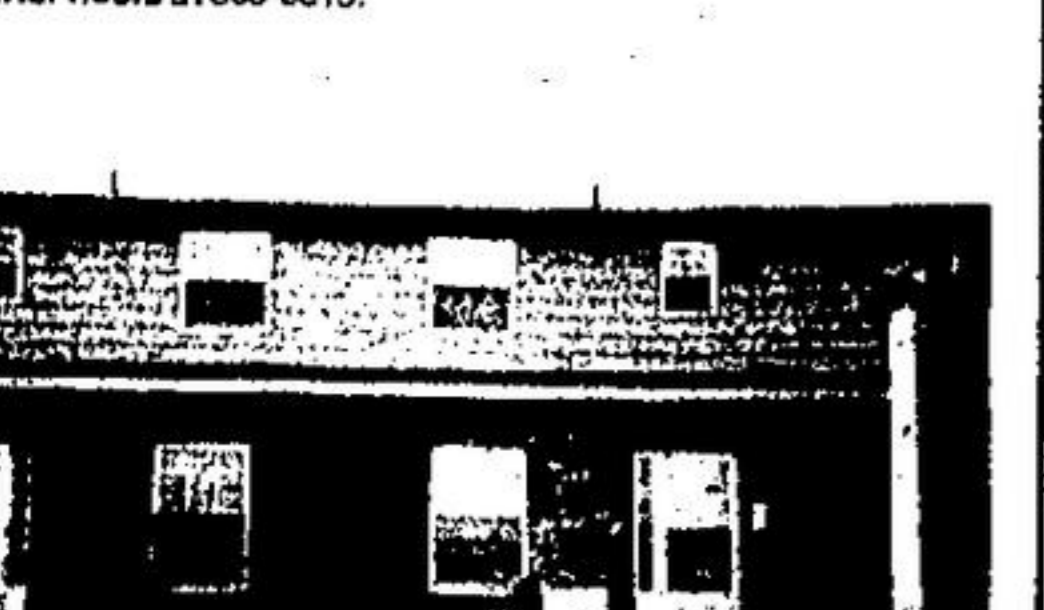
