This week's column will spend some time describing the programs designed to maintain your community parks and open spaces.

Unlike a number of other communities, (most of which are larger in size), our town does not have an independent parks department. The annual maintenance program is designed by the works department and recreation and parks department in cooperation with the variety of community groups using park facilities. This program is then reviewed by council and appropriate monies are then budgeted in order to effectively complete this work.

The majority of scheduled work is performed by staff within the works department. However, the recreation and parks department for the last two summers has enlisted the services of a few park attendants located about the town to assist with the clean-up and beautification of parks program.

Last, but certainly not least, are the vast numbers of volunteers working with soccer and ball groups, to name a couple. They spend countless hours assisting staff employed by the town with parks maintenance. Marking of sport fields, et al, are items that, if performed by the town, would be costing us as taxpayers many more dollars. Many thanks to you for your interest and your help. It's sincerely appreciated.

**Maintenance program**  
 Among the most common of these jobs performed by the town are grass cutting, fertilization and sodding, preparation of ball diamonds, tree and flower program, planting, trimming and minor repairs to play and recreation facility equipment. The above, of course is not all inclusive, but does provide an overview of the kinds of maintenance being done.
