Wells doesn't answer question

Halton Board of Education is still waiting to find out if it has the right to decide if it needs facilities in Milton more than Burlington.

Last month the board sent a letter to Education Minister Tom Wells asking if the board still has the right to set capital project priorities after the province authorized spending \$1.7 million on a new school in Burlington. The board wants school facilities in Milton expanded.

This week the board received a letter from Wells which didn't say if the board still has the right to set priorities. Chairman Garry Morton said Thursday another letter has been sent to Wells now asking the question trustees want answered.

Wells said in his letter that after examination of all factors the province felt there was a more urgent need for new accommodations in the Palmer community of Burlington than Milton.

He did say if the situation has changed or new information is available the ministry would be "happy" to review the situation.

Wells said the board must realize that in light of restraints some use of portables must be accepted. Eight are being used in the Milton area now while 250 students in the Palmer area need accommodation.

Watson opposes future subdivision

Councillor Jim Watson continued his campaign against more housing in Milton by attacking proposed hamlet subdivisions in Campbellville, Brookville and Moffat, as well as one already approved in Esqueping, at Tuesday's Official Plan meeting in Campbellville.

"The real concern of our council is not residential development," he told the meeting. "The ratio of industrial assessment to residential assessment is 25-75 which is dreadful. We must supply more acres of industrial land."

Noting that the Esqueping subdivision south of Fifth Sideroad on Fourth Line was just east of the proposed industrial park owned by Milton, Councillor Watson said he was against it. He was also critical of the future Timberlea development which will add 1,438 lots to urban Milton.

"That's 8,000 more people and that's going to throw our ratio, even more out of whack."

Town Planner Bob Zsadyani pointed out that Amendment Seven, which is already before the province for inspection would zone enough land for industry to last 30-40 years.

"The president of the Canadian Industrial Realtors Board has looked at the land," said the planner, "and he believes it is one of the best sites west of Toronto for distribution industry."

Councillor Watson has gone on record during the past months as being against all types of residential development until the town's industrial assessment ratio catches up. At a recent Planning and Development Committee meeting he said he would fight any proposal to build more residential dwelling "right down the line."

No alternatives

Unless Halton Regional Council actively pursues alternatives to a major landfill site in Milton, "it will be guilty of creating its own emergency," according to environmental lawyer David Estrin.

In a letter dated May 10 to Dennis P. Caplice, Director of the Environmental Approvals Branch, of the Ministry of the Environment, Mr. Estrin expressed concern about public comments by Regional Chairman Ric Morrow. In those comments Mr. Morrow had suggested that the region wasn't considering alternatives to the Milton site (Site F). Mr. Estrin represents the Tremaine-Britannia Citizens' Group.

"That situation, I respectfully suggest, will not legally allow the Director to form the opinion, as he may pursuant to the Environment Protection Act, that an 'emergency' exists," the lawyer claimed.

If the Director was of that opinion, the lengthy environmental hearings could be dispensed with and a certificate issued, he suggested.

"It would seem to me that the Ministry of the Environment should point out to the Region that it should make as diligent attempts as possible to seek other sites or alternative methods of waste disposal, given the well-known and well-founded opposition to use of Site F at this time," Estrin said.

Estrin asked the Ministry to assure him that it will not process or assist the region in obtaining a certificate until the Ontario Municipal Board has ruled on the use of the land for waste disposal purposes.

According to Estrin it is not only inappropriate but illegal for the Ministry to consider an application for a certificate of approval for a dump site at this time.

In March of this year Regional Council passed resolutions and a by-law authorizing staff to purchase lands in the Site F area, to carry out hydrogeological testing and to apply for a certificate to the Ministry of the Environment.

On April 19 Estrin brought a motion into the Supreme Court of Ontario challenging the validity and Mr. Justice Cory quashed the by-law. The judge ruled that the region must make application

to Milton Council for a rezoning and official plan amendment, prior to purchasing any land or making application for a certificate.

North not affected Region may ration water

According to Regional Public Works Director Bob Moore there is a very real possibility that water rationing will be put into effect in both Burlington and Oakville this summer.

He said the problem is continuing difficulty in having pumping facilities and expansions to water works plants in Oakville and Burlington made.

He told the Regional Public Works committee at a meeting Wednesday that the matter had been before council and committee no less than six times before finally being approved.

Moore said that both municipalities have been forced to draw water from reservoirs during the last two years and the demand for water is increasing.

"I'm very nervous about the situation," he told the committee. "Water rationing and car washes will probably be among the first to be restricted if and when the water is rationed. Moore said it is essential

that enough water be left in the reservoirs to fight a major fire. He noted that good water supplies are credited with playing a major role in effectively fighting a major blaze in Toronto recently.

Regional Chairman Ric Morrow said he wanted staff to prepare a report indicating how rationing would be implemented if and when it becomes necessary.

Expansions are planned for both communities but Mr. Moore said there was no way the expansions would be completed for this year.

The problem is confined to the southern part of the region and Milton and Halton Hills won't be affected this year according to Moore.

Burlington Councillor Vern Connell said it is essential to make it clear to people that any water conservation program is also a program to save money. "It is hard to convince them that there is a need to save water when they see a whole lake full of it out there."
