Student from Nigeria speaker at Greenock

May meeting of Greenock Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. E. Winter, Mrs. R. Sinclair presiding.

Twenty-four ladies enjoyed hearing first hand information and pictures of Nigeria. Miss Becky Wilcox, a student in Food Sciences at Guelph University, spoke of her native land.

Approximately the same size as Ontario it has a population of 70 million. English is one of the main languages spoken. The native tongue has 214 dialects; 75 per cent are Moslems. They have many festivals, dressing in brightly colored costumes for their dances, etc.

Kobo is the coin relative to one cent: 100 Kobo equals one Naira (approximately \$1.65). They have a variation of four climates from savannah in the north where it reaches 100 degrees F or 38 degrees C in April, to tropical rain forests in the south.

Produce grown there are yams, peanuts, papaya, rice sorghum, bananas, pomegranate etc. with a growing season year round. They manufacture cars from their own natural resources and use, also export oil.

Mrs. McKeown thanked Becky for sharing her knowledge and hopes she continues to enjoy her stay in Canada.
