(Continued from Page 6) but whenever the land is sold, or used for purposes other than farming, all back taxes must be paid. Mr. Wright said this was ridiculous. "You might as well turn the farm over to the government," he retorted.

The Liberals, he said, feel the land should be taxed according to its productivity. This way, he claimed, good land would be taxed more than bad land.

The small businessman is very important to our country, says Mr. Wright. He pointed out that 50 to 60 per cent of Canadians work in small businesses where they can get hired faster than in the larger companies.

The Liberals have proposed a scheme whereby 100,000 people will find jobs, within the small business world.

The party is willing to pay small businessmen 20 per cent of the wages of a worker, not exceeding \$2000, who is currently on unemployment. Mr. Wright explained that if a person were to make \$10,000 a year, the employer would only have to pay \$8,000 to the employee. Income tax would be received from these people, so the government in turn, would be getting some of the money back.

Mr. Wright explained the federal government is, at present, paying out unemployment insurance for 100,000 people, at an average of \$6,000 each, per year. The provincial government would only be paying out \$2,000 a

year per person, a saving of \$4,000. The provincial government would, in turn negotiate with the federal government to absorb most of the 20 per cent. Only 100 per cent Canadian owned companies would be eligible for this assistance.

He cited the West Montrose Dam as another local issue. He feels the dam should be built, but it is important that all sides of the arguments are brought out. The area people should be heard loud and clear, because the area the dam affects is not going to receive any benefits from the project. Mr. Wright said he would oppose the dam.

Mr. Wright is a communication consultant. He makes recommendations on telephone equipment, both long distance and local service. He has held this job for ten years. Prior to this he worked for a telephone company for 13 years before going into private business. Mr. Wright was the first communication consultant in Canada.

The Liberal candidate is involved in Erin United Church, and is a past president of the Erin minor softball association. Mr. Wright has served on the executive of the square dancing club in Erin and led the concerned citizens group opposing two large proposed gravel pits in the Erin village area. He has three children, a son in high school, a son in Brisbane public school, and a daughter in the total immersion course, in Brisbane school.
