Victims of phys-ed system can't do proper chin-up

The physical fitness of Ontario elementary school students is alarming many physical education instructors including David Moore, outdoor education instructor for the Faculty of Education at the University of Toronto.

Moore, who lives in Milton, has taught in high schools and will be an outdoor education instructor at a high school in Etobicoke next year. He is familiar with the physical fitness of high school students.

"When kids in grade nine can't do one chin-up and are hard-pressed to do three or four push-ups then it's an admission ox how lacking our elementary physical education courses are," Moore said.

In an effort to improve and bring attention to the situation, Moore, along with other participants in a health conference on April 21-23, which was sponsored by the Physical Education Faculty of the University of Toronto, recently sent a three-part recommendation to the Ministry of Health and Education.

The three parts of the recommendation were that physical and health education be included as a core subject in the grade nine curriculum throughout Ontario, that the Ministry

of Education specify the minimum time allotments, and the general nature of the required instructional programs in Physical and Health Education for children in elementary schools; and that the Ministry of encourage Education school boards to employ a minimum of one qualified specialist teacher in Physical and Health Education for each school

minimum time allotment in elementary schools should be one hour a day. He said the recommendations were not criticizing the elementary teachers for their phys-ed pro-

Moore personally felt the

in Ontario.

"It's just that in elementary schools one teacher is responsible for 'everything from art to music. An elementary teacher just can't have the skill and energy for a proper physed program," Moore said. "Anyway it's damn near time that elementary teachers had at least one

spare a day." According to Moore there are enough qualified physed specialists to put in every school,

"There's no doubt it's a monetary matter," he said. To correct this, Moore feels the Ministry of Health and Recreation should pool its resources, particularly

Wintario funds, with the Ministry of Education.

"They could take some Wintario funds and put them into hiring physical education specialists in each school for five years to see if it improves things," Moore said. "If it does then continue it." The current ad cam-

paigns by the Ministry of Health and Recreation are aimed at the wrong people, Moore said. "It's very important to

get hold of the students in their formative years in school," he said. "It's easier to convince a young mind that you can both enjoy and benefit from physical activity." In most cases it isn't until

students reach high school that they come into contact with a physical education specialist and by this time, Moore said it's too late.

"What are you going to do? You can't put all the physically unfit kids into remedial phys-ed," he said. "By then a person feels inadequate because he can't do a push-up so he begins to think 'who needs the aggravation of making a fool of yourself in front of your classmates' and

"And it's not his fault," added Moore, "It's the fault of the poor training system."

Moore feels the situation in Halton is not as bad as it is in other areas but added this was only because of "all out gut-wrenching" by several teachers

Yet the situation is far from perfect.

"I am horrified that

DAVE MOORE, an outdoor physical education instructor for the Faculty of Education at the University of Toronto claims that the elementary phys-ed program is inadequate and needs to be revamped.
