To Property Owners In The Town of Halton Hills
THE ONTARIO WEED CONTROL ACT
as it applies to persons in possession of land within the Town of Halton Hills
Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by June 13th, 1977, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens, The Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.
Goatsbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
