## Snow, Kerr win

Oakville MPP Jim Snow and Burlington South's George Kerr had no trouble holding onto their area seats in Thursday's provincial election. Both won by landslides—or was it a snowslide in Snow's case?

The Conservative MPP, Minister of Transportation and Communications, Snow polled 14,000 votes to the Liberal candidate Walt Elliot's 8,000 in Oakville. NDP Doug Black pulled in 6,000 votes.

Snow formerly represented Halton but switched to run in the new Oakville riding when Halton-Burlington was formed a year and a half ago. He still lives in Hornby, which is in the Halton-Burlington riding.

Minister of the Environment George Kerr claimed the Burlington South riding with a big plurality, polling 18,000 votes. Others in the race were Liberal John O'Boyle at 10,000, NDP Bill Brown at 7,000 and a Libertarian candidate, John Lawson, who polled 675 votes.

# Gleeful Grits greet jubilant Julian

It was Julian Reed all the way, Thursday night. The mood in Liberal Headquarters changed from cautious optimism to jubilant elation in the room that became jammed and hotter as the night went on, until the Reed win by 3,734 votes was a sure thing.

Laurie Reed, Julian's brother, after the first four polls showed Reed well ahead in each, warned the enthusiastic Grits there were a lot of polls to come. Occasionally he lost his cool long enough to shout "That was a Tory poll last year."

A roar of surprise went up when Reed polled 90 to Gray's 83 in George Gray's home poll.

A joyous reception greeted Julian and Deanna Reed, at 9 p.m. Told by yelling supporters "You've done it, You've done it!" He stared in disbelief and said it was far too early to be so sure. Half convinced by the scoreboards, he climbed on a chair and told the group they had done it, not him. Ruffling Deanna's hair he said "and a lot of thanks goes to this girl here". Choking up both from emotion and a heavy chest

and throat cold, Reed simply thanked everyone, and invited them all to the victory party at the Way-Jay Club.

Flowers appeared for Deanna Reed, and a corsage for seven year old Melanie who was bright and alert until late in the night.

From the headquarters and homes all over the area, 500 enthusiastic supporters converged on the Way-Jay Club for a triumphant victory party.

With big smiles on their faces Julian Reed and wife Deanna led off the dancing. Then giving in to yells of "Let's have a song, Julian", Julian with a scratchy throat, brought down the house with "Deillah", and "I've seen the Light". He had to quit when his throat and voice gave out. He had been fighting a bad

case of flu and heavy cold in his chest and throat for the

Loud cheers and clapping broke out when Bill Johnson hobbled in on crutches to congratulate the winner. The camaraderie between them was evident when Reed hugged him and called him "the greatest campaigner and the greatest guy".

At 10:15 George Gray entered Liberal headquarters where he admitted he had gone all out to win the riding.

Reed said he had been stricken with flu, Wicked Willie (Bill Johnson) was on crutches and George was in good shape. "He must be the bionic man", he commented.

Gray went on to make a plea for regional government, telling Reed not to dismantle it. To a gasp from the audience, Gray replied, "Don't gasp, the name of the game is progress." He was cut short by a shout of "That's enough speech-making."

## Lease car

Halton Region Administration Committee approved of plans to sell the existing car the region owns and makes available to the regional chairman for his use.

Instead of buying another car, the committee decided the chairman should be allowed to spend up to \$225 per month to lease a car.

Chairman Ric Morrow said the car the region has now has over 60,000 miles on it and is in need of repairs.

He said he had priced the rental of a Mercury Marquis and a Pontiac Parisienne.

Morrow had suggested he would pay the region \$500 per year for the use of the car but that suggestion was dispensed with and never even voted on.

The committee's action will be confirmed or rejected at council today.

Interested in purchasing the Domtar plant "is moving from the East of Canada"—he meant Quebec—was certainly more than a little embarrassing to Georgetown and Scott and it was the first time this had been mentioned publicly, to my knowledge.

The only Eastern Canada production facilities Scott has are at Crabtree, near Montreal. However the company denies emphatically that it intends moving its plant especially since it is spending \$7 million this year on capital improvements at Crabtree.

One last thing, if the identity of Scott was originally as secret as claimed it seems strange that Jonathan Fear, a Globe and Mail reporter was given the name

by a farmer whom he met casually while roaming North Halton on an election assignment.

The farmer wasn't George Gray, I hasten to add, and Fear at the time didn't realize the significance of the piece of information he had been given, well before The Star story of June 2. Fear told me, he didn't realize the identity of Scott was supposed to be so secret.

Under the circumstances, as mentioned in the first paragraph of this letter, I believe I deserve an apology from Mayor Hill. I have been a news reporter for 20 years, I am a straight-shooting guy and do not have to put up with this kind of thing.

I have a public service to perform in informing citizens

of what goes on in North Halton and I will try hard not to be used to promote news only as politicians or anyone else would like it when the facts appear somewhat different.
