Some Gray supporters blamed Mayor Tom Hill for the Scott Paper problems, but Mayor Hill wasn't saying much about the subject.

Wellington-Dufferin-Peel

Landslide victory for incumbent J. Johnson

encumbent Jack Johnson in Thursday's provincial election in Wellington-Dufferin-

Mr. Johnson swept the with 14,272 votes, almost 5,000 votes ahead of his closest contender Liberal David Wright, who, finished with 9,631. New Democratic : candidate Marion Chambers chalked up 7,225 votes.

In the October 1975 election, Mr. Johnson won the seat with 12,110 votes, only 700 ahead of Liberal candidate Ted Sibbald who had 11,398. The NDP candidate Gerry Campbell polled 6,313 votes.

Mr. Johnson's overwhelming victory in Thursday's election resulted largely at the Liberals' expense. Mr. Wright dropped 2,000 votes over 1975, while the NDP candidate Mrs. Chambers gained 900 votes over the last provincial election.

Voter turnout was down in the Dufferin Peel riding this election, with only 67 per cent of eligible voters exercising their right. This was down from 69 per cent last election.

Mr. Johnson's support was not limited to one particular section of his some 5,000 square miles riding. He said the support was evenly distributed and he even topped the polls in Erin, home base for both the Liberal and NDP candidates.

The Member of Provincial Parliament said he was glad the NDP was no longer the official opposition. He explained "they voted against us on every issue." He con-tinued to say "while that may be the function of an opposition party, the rules are. changed in a minority government situation because a lost vote means a new election." He said he expects a Liberal opposition will be easier to work with.

David Wright said he expects to run again but admitted he can "see room for self-improvements." He feels the gain in Liberal leader Stuart Smith's popularity probably helped him (Mr. Wright) gain some votes.

Mrs. Chambers said she would have been surprised if she had won. She explained she has been with the party since its inception in the 1960's and is very realistic. The former school teacher said she thought they might have done better than they

actually did, however. The riding, one of the largest in Southern Ontario, is bounded by Bolton to the

It was an easy victory for south, Mount Forest and port Rd. to the East and Progressive Conservatives Shelburne to the north, Air- Drayton to the west.


