Ski expansion approval

In spite of continued opposition by Burlington Councillor Vern Connell Halton Regional Council passed a motion endorsing the proposed \$400,000 expansion at the Glen Ski area.
 The ski area is operated by Halton Region Conservation Authority and members and staffers of the authority had explained the need of the expansion to the Administration Committee last week during an exhaustive debate.
 The authority claims the expansion is needed to meet

the needs of skiers and members insisted that the loan which is required would be repaid through increased revenue that would be generated by the expansion.
 Connell argued that the authority had not proven it-

self as a good manager of money in the past and he claimed the project was a high risk venture and the region could be left having to repay all or part of the \$286,000 loan required for the project.
