Lions Club offers \$1,380 for new saunas

An electricians' strike may snag efforts by the Lions Club to install new saunas in the pool.

The strike, called Sunday, affects about 1,900 members of Local 353 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers in Metro Toronto and surrounding area. The strike affects here, according to pool supervisor Liz Binsfeld.

A letter from Acton Lions Club to Halton Board of Education was tabled during the town's general administration meeting Monday.

The club is committed to

paying for new sauna units for \$1,380 plus tax. A new sauna was installed at the pool in February for \$450.

According to the Lions Club the saunas were available for 50 per cent of the scheduled time. Pool supervisor Binsfeld reported to the club

during a meeting of the pool advisory committee that adult swimming had dropped since the saunas went out of operation.

A tentative date of the first week in September was set for installation of the saunas. That was before the strike.

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Youth Centre opens for teenagers

Teenagers ages 13 and 17 no longer have the excuse of "I've got nothing to do." The Halton Hills recreation department has started a Youth Activity Centre at the Scout Hall with the doors opening last night (Tuesday) for the first time.

The centre, under the leadership of Johanna

Vliestra, will be open Tuesday and Friday evenings from 7 to 10.30 p.m. Three other staff members will also be helping, as well as volunteers.

Acton and Esquesing recreation co-ordinator Anne Pickering explained that the Acton centre is closely co-

ordinated with similar centres in Georgetown, Burlington, and Milton, which are run by the Children's Aid.

There will be several things for teens to do during the evening. Crafts, sports activities, card games, music, ping pong and dances will be occurring simultaneously. So a choice in what to do will be available. Miss Pickering pointed out that what interests one person, does not appeal to another, but the centre will have many varying happenings at the same time.

Donations of games such as monopoly would be greatly appreciated, and teenagers

are encouraged to bring their own records. Miss Pickering said she is also seeking out volunteers who can teach macrame, leathercraft, baking etc.

Admission is free to the centre, but there could be a slight charge for the materials in the crafts session. Refreshments will be made available

Police can go on school property

Halton Regional Police can now go on any Halton Board of Education property.

Director of Education Em Lavender told trustees recently the board has made the police its agents so officers can go on school property to enforce the law.

Trustee Don Long said there had been problems of people drinking on school grounds and vandalizing board property in Georgetown. He said the police "allegedly" said they couldn't go on school property without board permission.

Long said the police say they can't charge anyone for being on public property with an open bottle of liquor. The offenders must be caught by officers consuming alcohol and suggested the board might petition Queen's Park for a change in the law.

Trustee Len Crosier said police can't go on private property without permission unless they suspect an indictable offence is taking place. Lavender said he had talked to police chief Ken Skerrett to straighten out the problem.

He said some members of

the force felt they couldn't go on school property without permission.

No immediate plans to fix up park land

Halton Hills works department won't be fixing up an area of Prospect Park beside Elmore Drive in the immediate future.

Monday, Halton Hills works committee decided the town can't go ahead with Councillor Peter Marks' request for piping of a ditch, levelling, top soiling in the park beside 76 Elmore Drive.

Deputy engineer Ted Ballinger reported nothing should be done until such time as the amount of storm sewer work to be done in the area is established.

He said the work to be done

in the park would cost about \$3,400.

Ballinger said part of the storm sewer work is slated to be done sometime in the next five years.

He concluded it would be unwise to upgrade the park until the storm sewer work is done.

Councillor Les Duby agreed with Ballinger saying it wouldn't make sense to do anything in the park until storm sewer plans are finalized.
