was the losing pitcher in the game. Ron Kelly gave Shaw all the help he needed with his first homerun of the year. Tournament The Seniors were again

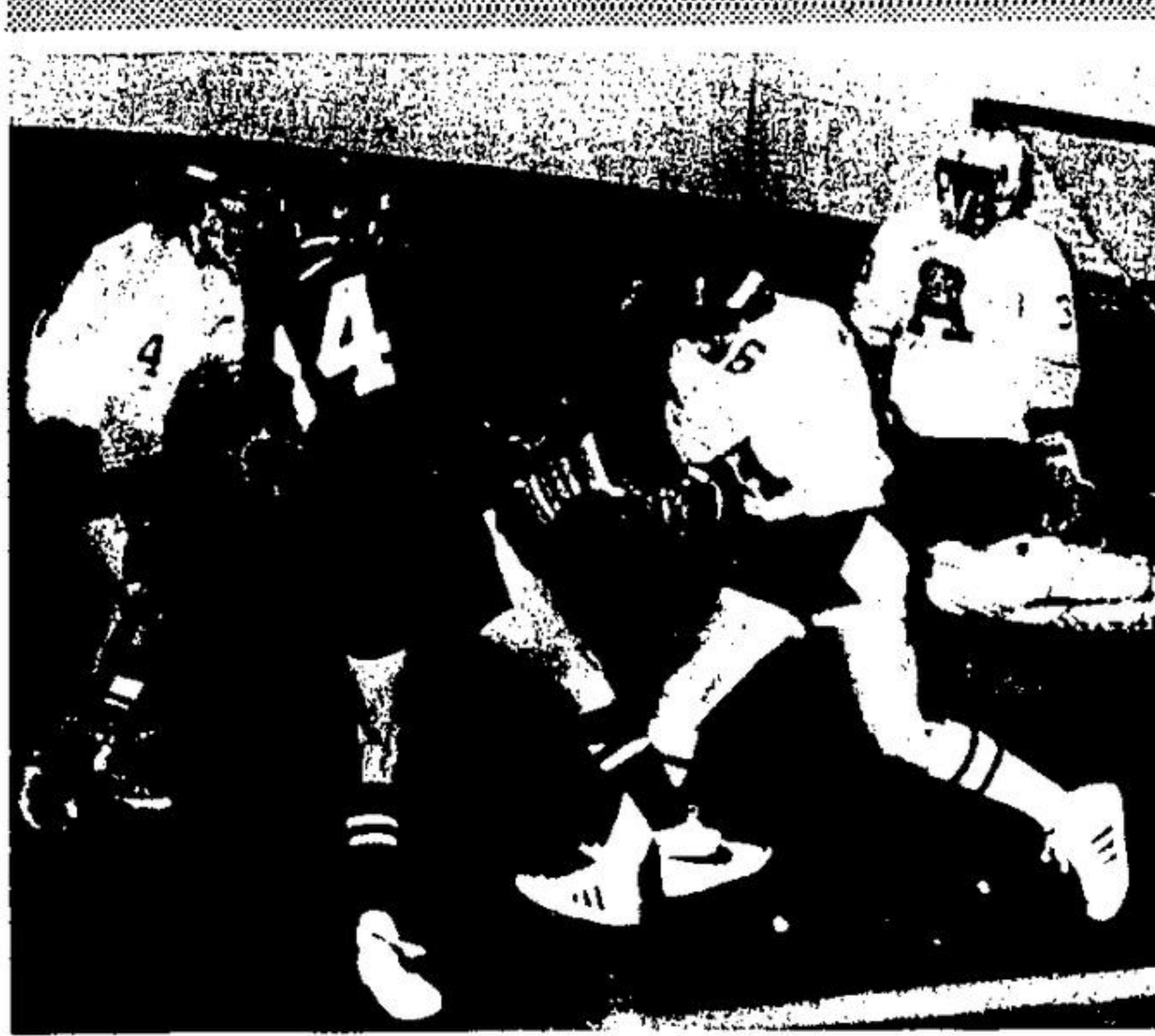

Bruce Hood referee school

Bruce Hood, a life long resident of Milton, but probably better known as the National Hockey League's senior referee, will be operating an unusual kind of hockey camp in Milton this summer.

What's unusual about the camp is that it isn't really a hockey camp, it's a referee's camp.

Known as The International School of Refereeing, the NHL approved camp will operate between Aug. 28 and Sept. 2 at E.C. Drury and Memorial Arena.

Ninety-six men from all over North America have paid \$220 for the entire program, which includes instruction by Bruce and his associates on and off the ice, materials necessary to learn, accommodation and maid service, all meals and the use of all the sporting facilities at E.C. Drury, where the men will be staying, and Memorial Arena.

Helping Bruce with on ice and off ice instruction are NHL officials Ron Wicks,

Bryan Lewis, John D'Amico, Leon Stickle, Randy Milton, Bruce Garside and Bob Hodges.

This is the first year the camp has been in Milton and because of the excellent facilities Bruce would like to continue the operations in Milton.

"This is the first year I've run it myself in Milton," he said. "This is also the first time the School has ever co-ordinated an event of this kind outside of town and educational co-operation."

Bruce said the idea behind the school is to develop and teach the individual the proper methods and rules involved in officiating.

During the week the public will be invited to listen to Scotty Morrison speak and will also be invited to attend a possible hockey game between the Milton Junior B Flyers and Georgetown Gemini. Proceeds from the hockey game will go towards the new arena.

Lifesaving course

Acton Lions' Pool is the scene of a national lifeguard certification program for the next week. Eight people are taking the course for the first time, with another eight or ten requalifying.

Passing the course qualifies a swimmer for lifeguard duties anywhere in the country, depending on the course taken. The Royal Lifesaving Society of Canada offers a pool course, a waterfront course and a surf course. Lifesaving requirements are different in each case.

The course at the pool will be a pool course, involving 40 hours, 20 of which are classroom lectures and 20 of which are practical in-water lessons.

Lectures cover such aspects of lifesaving as qualities of the lifeguard, pool maintenance, lifeguarding technique, use of equipment, the Ontario Public Health Act, an in-depth first aid and resuscitation section (which does not certify people for first aid), search and rescue methods, organization of the swimming area and liability. Each of the eight lectures is

followed by a practical demonstration and practice of what was covered. Potential guards learn how to differentiate between a weak swimmer or a tired swimmer, they are given the feeling of what it is like to deal with a real drowning victim and they learn methods of defense and different entries to be used in different situations.

The course ends with a test of all they have learned, plus tests of swimming speed and endurance. A mark of 75 per cent is necessary to pass the test.
