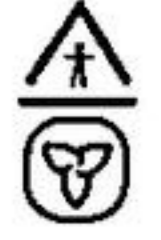

Businessman - pianist man of many talents

by Jennifer Barr According to the letterhead of DMS (Diversified Management Services) the company handles such fields as financial, marketing, merchandising, human resources, mergers and acquisitions, global realty services, investment services, manufacturers agents, charitable fund raising and management, ecology, agronomy, performing arts, talent bank agencies, technological services, and psychological testing.

This is amazing in itself but when one realizes that this company is headed up by the talented jazz pianist Duff Herlehy is nothing short of incredible. Duff, or Bud Duffy as he is more familiarly known to his Acton friends and neighbours, is one of the most versatile and interesting entertainers in the business. Professional friends such as the late Errol Garner, Oscar Peterson and Henry Cuesta have peopled Bud's evening hours but by day he is all management consultant. Few fans listening to Herlehy's easy flowing style at supper clubs or concert halls realize that their entertainer has a C.P.A., Master in Business Administration, Doctorate of Music degrees as well as two years of medicine and two years of journalism education.

Confused childhood It all started on St. Patrick's day 1918 in Watertown, New York, when little Austin Duffy was born—"a great day for the Irish", he quips. Some confusion over his parentage produced some interesting results—his mother turned out to be his grandmother, and his brother was his uncle, sort of thing—but Bud soon got that straightened out.

In his late teens he started work with his brother-uncle as an accountant and also took up the piano as a hobby. He became fascinated by the instrument and displayed considerable talent. However, a baseball accident causing a totally smashed hand ended his playing for some 20 years. Meanwhile, he rapidly climbed the ladder of the business world acquiring enough knowledge to become an independent management consultant. Among his many credits are years in manufacturing, marketing, real estate development, and accounting. He was Treasurer of the Provincial Association of the Ontario Motor League; Canadian General Manager of Eriez—a company dealing in industrial magnetics; he was with A. P. Green and was affiliated with the National Rehabilitation Foundation for the Disabled in Toronto—among other things.

Not enough However, all this wasn't enough and in 1963 finding his injured hand responding to the piano once more, he took refresher courses at the Philadelphia School of Music, ending up with his Doctorate in 1967.

He met Henry Cuesta in Toronto one night while listening to the great Willy 'The Lion' Smith play. Through him Bud was able to make contacts and start on his successful music career. He's since played all over Toronto, worked with the United Campaign playing in Toronto hotels, played for four years at Runway 23 at the Skyline and used to do concerts for Universities to endow the alumni scholarship funds. He's even managed other acts. Herlehy also plays the organ but says he's not in any sense a concert organist although a jazz oriented concert pianist—yes.

He's been influenced by Art Tatum, Hamad Jahmal, Peter Nero, Andre Previn, and Oscar Peterson whom he considers the greatest pianist alive today. The pianist-business man says he loves music and has loved it all his life, "I never cared to be a giant of the industrial world."

Talented family This busy man has also had time to acquire a family. His wife Marjorie loves music and plays herself although she won't compete with Bud. For the past 25 years she's been executive secretary to the Canadian director and general sales manager for Barber Green Canada Ltd. Son Michael is vice-president of the Bank of British Columbia in Vancouver and operates a record company, Sunburst Records, with his father. Daughter Carol Anne Wakefield is a commercial artist running Wakefield Agencies with her husband and is involved in animation, currently producing a syndicated cartoon. She won the CNE prize for art in 1973 and '74. Now recuperating from a cerebral hemorrhage, Bud is operating his business and living on residuals.

He's writing music and plans to get back playing by the fall although he'll never "do another club again". He's under contract to London Records to produce records for the European market and hopes to fulfill that contract. Until then, he's enjoying life with his music and grumbling about the road construction plaguing Acton.

Town asks

Fix region roads for gravel trucks

Halton Hills wants the region to fix up its roads in Halton Hills so trucks carrying stone from Indusmin quarry will have an alternative route once they are banned from the Fourth Line and 17 Sideroad. After hearing residents' pleas twice and receiving a petition, Halton Hills works committee recommended to council a by-law be drawn up restricting vehicle weights on the two roads. Monday council approved the suggestion. Munday council passed a resolution calling for the Region to take whatever measures are necessary to force gravel trucks to use regional roads.

Councillor Peter Pomeroy said this was a way for the town to find out if the region will fix up 22 and 15 Sideroads for truck traffic. The wooden railway bridge on 22 Sideroad wouldn't take truck traffic and 15 Sideroad isn't good enough for the trucks because of a narrow culvert. Pomeroy and others felt the region should bring these two roads up to standard so trucks can use them. At the same meeting Councillor Peter Morris asked if residents on the two roads who are complaining

built their homes after Indusmin started trucking stone out 17 Sideroad back in 1962. Councillor Russ Miller said many of the homes have changed hands and Mayor Tom Hill agreed noting a lot of the homes have been built since limestone started being hauled out of the quarry. Morris said the town shouldn't be imposing a hardship on the industry and trucks since residents moved there knowing there would be trucks going by. He warned the decision to try and ban trucks could cause residents on other streets to complain.

Hill said this wasn't likely since the trucks will now have to travel west on 22 Sideroad to Highway 25. He rejected a prediction by Councillor Pat McKenzie the trucks would now go up Churchhill Road south into Acton causing problems for urban residents. Hill thought it was unlikely the trucks would go into Acton. Councillor George Maltby said the Morris assessment of the situation wasn't direct since trucks didn't really start coming out 17 Sideroad until 1968 and by then many of the new homes in the area had been built.

Pomeroy says

Booth should get facts

Councillor Roy Booth shouldn't level charges against the rest of council until he makes sure he has his facts straight. Councillor Peter Pomeroy says. Last week at a meeting of Halton Hills finance administration committee Booth warned councillors on council for several years if any of the interest on the \$400,000 library debenture has been spent. Booth suggested money accruing from the debenture must be spent on payment of the debenture or costs could be charged back to individual councillors. He said according to the Municipal Act councillors could be barred from council for several years if the interest is spent. Deputy treasurer Grant Usher sent a report to council stating the part of the Municipal Act Booth mentioned refers to sinking funds, not debenture money. His report stated none of the money in the original debenture has been spent but \$17,000 of the interest has been.

"In essence, it is my opinion that no problem exists regarding this above section of the Municipal Act as it applies to council in this instance," Usher said. "Before a councillor makes statements that insult the integrity of the whole council he should base his assumptions on fact rather than fiction," Pomeroy said when he contacted this paper regarding Booth's statements.

\$600 collision on Main St.

A Main Street South collision between two cars totalled \$600 in damages, Tuesday July 12, evening. The vehicle driven by Roman Von-Arx, R. R. 1 Acton, was damaged to a total of \$250, police say. The second vehicle, driven by Gerhard Dietz, of Burlington, took the remainder of the damage.

Caretakers get raise

Halton Board of Education's 219 full time caretakers will receive a 7.2 per cent pay hike. The new agreement took effect July 1. The average hourly pay jumps from \$5.54 to \$5.80 and including fringe benefits the total package is worth an eight per cent hike. Under the old agreement the board paid its full time caretakers over \$2.5 million last year.
