## Jail food is bug free office says

No bugs or hair were found in the food served to inmates last year at Milton Jail according to Phillip Patterson, Director of Correctional and Psychiatric Services for the Ontario Ombudsman's office.

Mr. Patterson said a story in the Thursday, July 21, Toronto Globe and Mail had erred in stating that bugs and hair had been found in the inmates' food during an investigation by the Ombudsman's office.

He said The Globe and Mail reporter must have read the Ombudsman's report incorrectly.

During the investigation in July, 1976, the Ombudsman's office did receive a complaint from one of the inmates about bugs and hair being in the food, said Mr. Patterson.

But no evidence of this was found upon investigation. Patterson did say the kitchen area was found to be messy and in disarray.

Since then, he added, the situation in the kitchen has been resolved.

Derek Hinks, superintendent of the jail since June, said he had no record of the complaint mentioned in the Ombudsman's report.

Neither did his predecessor, Carl DeGrandis, he added.

The kitchen situation has improved, he said since they increased the storage area while reducing the food stocks. "We're bringing more food in on a regular basis," said Mr. Hinks. "Instead of ordering a month's supply we order a weekly supply."

The jail has one full-time chef and two casual cooks who are employed by the jail. Mr. Hinks said two or three inmates will also help in the kitchen but these are mainly porters doing work such as cleaning dishes.

## Jeff Nurse guest at meeting

Jeff Nurse once again showed his expertise when he gave a clipping and grooming demonstration.

Following the roll call and minutes, President Marie Murray announced the forthcoming 4-H events. Plans were also made for the skill to be presented at 4-H Fun Night.

Club leader Nino Braida thanked Mr. Nurse on behalf of all the members and leaders for his great contribution to the meeting. Stephen Lasby thanked the Brown family on behalf of all those present.

Following the adjournment of the meeting, lunch was served by the host family.
