He said he didn't have the exact figures to back it up but estimated Acton taxes would go up by as much as 40 per cent if Acton was reconstituted as a town.

"I think they will find we haven't got the assessment base to support a unit of our own. No one can go back to 1973 figures because we've come throught five vicious years of inflation.

"If you look back to what it cost then (1973) and take out the rapid rise in education costs the areas Halton Hills has control of hasn't increased by a great deal. The increase would be less than the rate of inflation," he said.

He sald Halton Hills had

paid for a lot of work out of current taxes instead of debenturing. Mr. McKenzie that while Acton representatives on the council are outnumbered the Georgetown councilors don't block vote and the Acton area gets more than its share of

Asked about the loss of identity in Acton McKenzie said it is the same for Acton as Georgetown and Esquesing. He said Halton Hills is used only in government and Acton continues to be used as a mailing address.

"If there is a Georgetown there is an Acton and there is and there always will be."

McKenzie explained that Acton picks up about one fifth of the tab for the operation of Halton Hills.
