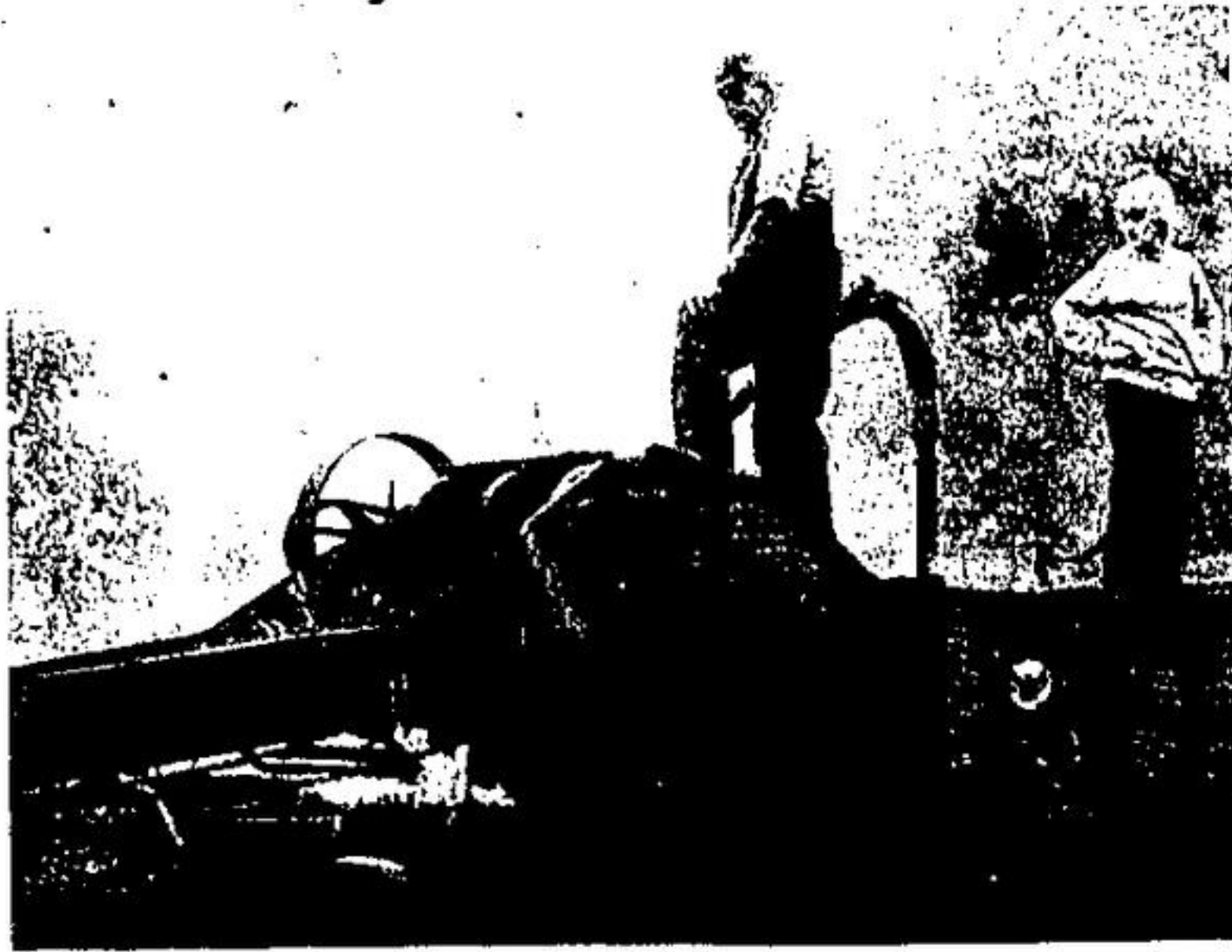


Old-style threshing bee at Ken Murray farm Saturday



An old fashioned threshing bee drew friends and neighbors to the farm of Ken and Doll Murray Saturday. The old-type equipment delighted the viewers as they took turns pitching the bales of wheat straw up onto the conveyor belts and into the separator.

The straw, chopped fine, is used for bedding for cattle. The grain is ground up for feed. This "chop" is especially high in protein.

The 1943 tractor is owned by Don Ross of the John Deere dealership.

The old thresher is owned by Ken Murray.

Between bouts of threshing, the group enjoyed corn lifted from a huge, steaming boiler and roasts of beef done to perfection in an outdoor barbecue, with buns and all the trimmings.

One neighbour flew low over the group in his plane.

After the sunset, a bonfire was lit as the groups still enjoyed the summer night in the fields.

New rest home offers comfortable life

The Cher Rest Home on Highway 25 offers a peaceful, home-like atmosphere, for those over 65 years of age. It is also helping to alleviate a great shortage of living quarters in this area for the elderly.

Operated by Edward Cherwoniak and his daughter-in-law Tryphena, the home offers 17 beds, of which only three have been filled. The rest home doors opened to these people about one month ago, and Mr. Cherwoniak expects all the beds will be filled in another month or so.

With the help of son (and husband) Brian Cherwoniak, the house about half a mile south of Acton has been completely renovated, and the family hopes to add on an addition in the future.

Mrs. Cherwoniak is experienced in looking after the elderly, and although the family does not live in the house, there is one of them there at all times. There is also a staff member present around the clock and a doctor and registered nurse on call 24 hours a day.

Meals offered feature a variety of well balanced food daily, all strictly laid out by a doctor. If necessary, the cook will prepare special diets for those with eating problems or diabetics.

There are eight bedrooms, and although each person has their own room now, when the home is filled there will be various numbers in each room. Some rooms have three beds, some two, and some one. Mr. Cherwoniak (Sr.) explained that with the various personalities of people, some will prefer a triple room, while others will insist on a single room, to be by themselves.

There are two acres of well kept grounds for the residents to enjoy, with sunny spots, and shady spots, depending on their mood. There is also a color television and various games to keep them occupied.

Relatives and other visitors are allowed to come and go as they please. Mrs. Cherwoniak is pleased to note that the three residents have had plenty of visitors lately, helping them to overcome the loneliness of age.

Because the Cher Rest Home has just opened, there are still a lot of vacancies open to anyone over 65 who is not in need of nursing care. The Cherwoniaks are more than willing to offer any assistance they can in providing a home for qualifying people.

Local police solve 49% of July crime
