Wins 50 silver dollars in 4-H essay and quiz

Four 4-H members from Halton participated in the annual 4-H Silver Dollar Competition sponsored by United Breeders' Inc. This competition was held on two different dates. The quiz and the essay sections were written at the United Breeders' Headquarters in Guelph on Friday, Aug. 19. The calf and showmanship sections took place at the Erin fair grounds on Saturday, Sept. 3.

Holly Hurren, Campbellville, placed third out of 65 contestants. Holly also had the high score for the essay part of the competition. For her efforts, Holly received 50 silver dollars.

In fifth place was Marilyn McNabb, Georgetown. Tom Dolsen from Peel had 833 points to top the competition. Holly Hurren had 822; Marilyn McNabb 811; Beth Marshall, Milton had 783; and Donna Stewart, Horby with 747 points.

In the showmanship classes the results were as follows—Junior, fourth, Marilyn McNabb; Intermediate, second, Donna Stewart; fourth Beth Marshall; Senior, Holly Hurren was second.

Calf classes—Junior, third, Marilyn McNabb; Intermediate, ninth, Holly Hurren; Senior, fourth, Donna Stewart; and 14th, Beth Marshall.

Each competitor in the competition received 10 silver dollars.

The total included 867 graduate degrees from master's through doctorate, and 309 bachelor's degrees. In addition an honorary doctorate of humane letters was presented to Dr. John A. Marvel, president of the Colorado State College and University Consortium.

REGISTRATION:
At the Ernest C. Drury School, Hwy. 25 in Milton Thursday, September 22 and Thursday, September 29, 7:00-8:30 p.m. First come, first served basis: classes small.

The following courses are 8 sessions in length, 2 hours per night. Fee \$20.00. Will be repeated after Christmas, with registration January 5.

EXT 8153 Crocheting
This course teaches the student how to do simple stitches working to more difficult ones. How to hold your work and finish seams, join yarn, sew on buttons and increase and decrease.

EXT 8640 Knitting
The course is designed to teach the student the basic knitting stitches progressing to the more difficult stitches. Students will use both 2 and 4 needles. The course will also cover repairs and embroidery on knitted garments.

EXT 8268 Macrame (Beginning)
With four basic knots you can combine them in a multitude of ways to make wallhangings, purses, and other creative yet functional items.

EXT 8676 Needlepoint
This course will cover needlework as an art form. Students will be encouraged to experiment with various textures, colors and techniques.

EXT 8449 Yoga
Physical and mental well being through exercise, breath control and relaxation. Men and women all ages (must bring blanket).

EXT 8907 Christmas Crafts
This will include wreaths, tree ornaments, door decorations and centerpieces with a look at beautiful decorations as well as gift ideas (\$5.00 material fee).

The following Management Development course will meet for 10 sessions, 3 hours per night. Fee \$50.00.

HRC 2800A Human Relations
Areas Covered: Understanding people, selection and induction, training employees, developing and maintaining morale, elements of wage and salary administration, effective communications, appraising employee performance, discipline and corrective action, understanding the collective agreement, planning and organizing for results.

DATES: Classes begin Thurs. Oct. 6 at 7:00 p.m. unless otherwise indicated. For 20 session courses, 10 will be held before Christmas and 10 after the new year beginning January 12, 1978. Look for the January registration, January 5, 1978.

EXT 8788 Psychology of the Deaf Child
This is a basic survey course which aims at explaining the various aspects of human behavior as it relates to the deaf child.

EXT 8232 Total Communications
Fingerspelling and sign language for hearing people interested in being able to communicate with deaf people.

EXT 8238 Typing
A course for beginners and those who have typing skills and wish to improve those skills and speed.

EXT 8769 Consumer Mathematics
Included in this course will be an understanding of insurance, a study of government forms and taxes and a survey of the metric system (Deaf Students Only). Fee \$5.00.

EXT 8237 Gym & Swim (Women)
Keep fit and trim with an informal group in a well equipped gym, followed by a relaxing recreational swim.

EXT 8230 Language for the Deaf (Deaf Students Only)
Total Communication method used. To further improve your understanding of written information and instructions with Insurance, Hospitalization, simple Law and many other topics being used as a basis of instruction. Fee \$5.00.

EXT 8233 Sewing
An interest course for beginners and anyone interested in furthering their sewing skills on a self-choice project basis.

EXT 8240 Woodworking
Come and make those pieces of furniture you have always planned but put off because the machines and tools to do the job were not available—they are here together with professional help and instruction (two classes).

FEES: Indicated with course descriptions. Fee for deaf students and senior citizens \$5.

The following courses are 20 sessions in length, 2½ hours per night. Fee \$40.00 (includes \$10.00 material fee).

EXT 8243 Auto Body Repair
An opportunity to do simple body repairs servicing and small area of paint refinishing.

EXT 8453 Ceramics - Second Step
A course for those with some experience in hand building and wheel work with the emphasis on expanded techniques and experiences with clay.

EXT 8245 Offset Printing (with Letterpress)
A basic course which includes paste-up, photography for Graphic Arts on a process camera, plate making and press work. In letterpress, type setting and small press work will be covered. Print your own letterhead, envelopes and business cards.

EXT 8242 Welding
An introductory course in gas or arc welding or the opportunity to improve present skills.

The following credit courses are 10 sessions in length, 3 hours per night. Fee \$35.00.

ACC 2101 Accounting 1
The purpose of this course is to provide the students with a knowledge of basic accounting procedures and theory which will enable them to develop an understanding of how accounting serves management, the investor, government and the public by producing useful financial data. It will also serve as a framework for more advanced studies in accounting or for a better understanding of related concepts in other areas of business specialization. Topics covered include the recording of transactions, the worksheet, accounting for a merchandising concern, columnar journals and subsidiary ledgers, the voucher register and internal control.

FAX 1100 First Aid (Standard)
The standard course of First Aid must have a minimum of 16 hours of formal theory and practical sessions, after which a written and practical test is taken. Each participant must satisfy a St. John Ambulance Examiner that he or she is capable of handling any given emergency situation. This is a more intensive first aid training than that in the "Emergency First Aid Course", and is required by the Workmen's Compensation Board for First Aiders in companies with more than five employees. Others trained to the Standard level include policemen, firefighters, school teachers, playground supervisors, first year nursing and medical students, as well as the general public.
