Heavy equipment courses

Vaccination of pets urged

The Ontario Humane Society warns that rabies and distemper are highly dangerous, infectious diseases. There is no known cure for rabies, and distemper is fatal in numerous

Owners can protect their pets against the spread of these and other diseases with a simple, annual program of vaccinations. The Ontario Humane Society urges everyone to

have pets vaccinated and to keep the program up to date. Ontario sportsmen should have their dogs vaccinated against rabies before this year's fall hunting season due to an expectedly high incidence of rabies which may equal the peak year of 1958, Natural Resources Minister Frank S.

Miller also warned this week. Ministry field offices in Southern Ontario have been receiving telephone calls from the public concerning suspected animals, many of which, on examination, were

diagnosed as rabid. According to the Canada Department of Agriculture, 167 cases of animal rabies were reported in Ontario during June and July this year.
