## Great Danes prove versatility over course

World renown for their reliability as working dogs and house guards, 47 of the best Great Danes in Southern Ontario had an opportunity to demonstrate their versatility and endurance over a one mile cross-country obstacle course behind the home of Gerry and Sonia Mazur in Glen Williams, Sunday.

The dogs and their owners braved an early morning drizzle to compete for trophies in The Great Dane Club of Canada's first field trials. A similar event was held at Kansas City in the U.S., last year, but Sunday's competition in the Glen was the first in Canada.

With their dogs on a six foot lead, owners ran alongside over the mile course, first coaxing them over four hurdles, then walking them across a shallow crossing of the Credit River, climbing hills made slippery by the rain, across a footbridge, back across a part of the river which is deep enough that both had to swim, back over five hurdles and on to the finish line. In most cases, the dogs were in good shape at the finish, while their owners were exhausted.

Teams took anywhere from just under five minutes to 15 (for stubborn dogs who balked at crossing the river) to complete the course. First prize went to Zeus and his owners Shirley and Ralph Lehman of Hamilton, who completed the course in 5.50. Meridia and Henry Van Den Hoff of Niagara Falls finished second in 7.10 and Sarah with

Donna Clare of Beeton was third in 8.30. A veterinarian, Dr. Andy Fletch of Beeton, was on duty to treat cuts and scratches the dogs suffered, but by noon hour he hadn't had a request. Dr. Fletch, an owner of Great Danes himself, explained that the club was first formed in 1948. Until last year, when members took their dogs to Kansas City for field trials, Great Danes were primarily show dogs. Owners groomed them for weekend shows which begin in late March and continue until November.

The club's main aim is the education and betterment of the breed. A special committee, Danes in Distress, looks after picking up dogs who have ended up in pet shops or pounds. The Mazurs, who formerly lived in the U.S., got the idea for the field trials when they attended last year's event in Kansas City. They did not compete Sunday, however, choosing to serve as hosts for the day.

## Two Acton girls make H.H. gym club

Two Acton girls, Penny Sieber and Carrie Gudgeon, have been selected to the Halton Hills gymnastics club, a noteworthy achievement according to Joan Aggiss, who supervises gymnastics in Halton Hills.

## Actonian submits brief to federal government

Prisoners in North American penal institutions deserve the basic human rights set out in the Canadian Bill of Rights, according to Art Meunier, veteran of 42 years behind bars.

In a brief submitted to the prime minister, the minister of justice and the solicitor general of Canada, Mr. Meunier, who now lives in Acton, said "convicted persons must not be considered as things. They have the right to be respected as human beings, and to be self determining."

To this end he advises prisoners to make what few decisions they can while in prison, to maintain their own self esteem. These can be as small as the decision to watch or not watch television.

A prisoner, argues Mr. Meunier, has to feel like a human being if he is to return to society. If he becomes too

dependent on the prison he will more easily fall back into it on his release.

Guards are to blame for much of the prisoners' trouble, according to Mr. Meunier. "I would forever be tantalized and threatened and screamed at, not by inmates, but only by prison guards."

Mr. Meunier decries the guards for their repressive and backwards attitudes which lead them to harass prisoners. "Some of the latter (guards) have their own antiquated philosophy on how they would treat the prisoner if they were permitted to do so, and some often do so anyway and get away with it," he writes.

He recommends a comprehensive training system for guards to reduce the problem, pointing out the "it is not unusual to provide nine months training for a game warden but only six weeks for a prison guard."

Meunier also feels young offenders should not be put in with "hardened and calloused" criminals, to prevent their learning how to commit crimes and get away with them.
