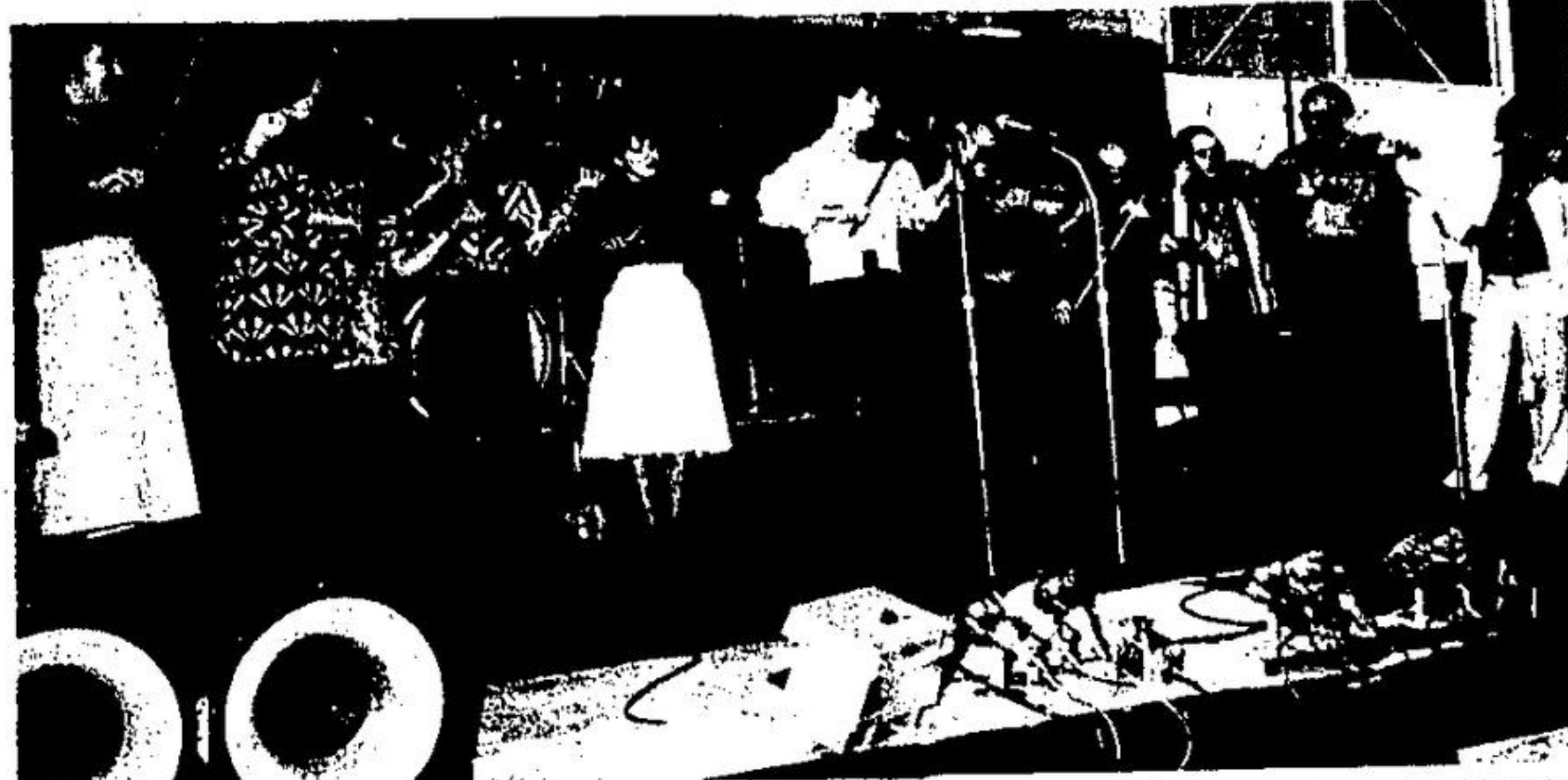


Fiddlers' contest Sunday afternoon

His team pulled 10,600 lbs two feet, four inches, and Clarence Plumtre of Lindsay got a fourth place prize with one foot, nine inches. First time

Top winners in hall honored on Sunday

The presentations were made in the arena while the judges were determining the winners of the fiddlers' contest.

Called first to the platform

was Susan Palichuk, R.R. 1, Acton, who had the most points in flower classes.

Mrs. J. S. McLean of Streetsville had the most points in homecrafts and also the most points in domestic science.

Kim Lawrence, R.R. 4, Rockwood, amassed the highest number of points in the junior section.

Mrs. Earl Steckley, 18 Division St., received the trophy and ribbon for the most points in crafts and hobbies.

Mrs. Heather Rennie had the highest total number of points in all these classes. She received a carafe mounted in silver.

Winner for canned and pre-

served products Mrs. Brian Hammond, 125 Longfield, was not present.

Mrs. Gibson announced the winners in school classes. Lesley Kenny was present to accept the Vivian Beer trophy for the best entry in the essay contest.

The top students in school work classes were not present; they were Jill Morris of the McKenzie-Smith school and Rod Witherly of Speyside.

Mrs. McLean, who brought her entries from Streetsville, has been entering in fairs for 32 years and this year is taking in seven fairs, she said.

Wayne Barnaby won first and third prizes in the black and white competitions. First prize went to a picture of a silhouetted backyard with a bright open clearing in the centre. Third prize was the Georgetown Pentecostal church at night.

Rick Gibson won second prize in this category with a scenic picture of a country road, leading to nowhere.

Honorable mentions go to: Joan Morris for her picture of a woman reading a book; Pat Marchment, for her picture of small child in bed; Mr. Bormann for his photo of grazing sheep; and Wayne Barnaby for a winter snow scene, two children kissing, and a sail boat on Fairy Lake.
