Canadian conference

Ombudsmen visit Maloney home

Arthur Maloney, QC, Ombudsman for Ontario, hosted the delegates attending the Canadian Conference of Legislative Ombudsmen to a reception and lunch at his rural Milton farm.

About 100 people including seven provincial Ombudsmen, their assistants and support staffs attended the luncheon and enjoyed a beautiful day in the country. Guests mingled on the side lawn at the Maloney farm on Guelph Line in the former Nassagaweya area and inspected the well kept grounds and natural farm pond, that enhances the century-old stone farmhouse where Mr. and Mrs. Maloney reside.

The luncheon was mainly an informal affair. Rev. Russell Findlay, minister of Ebenezer United Church said grace and Halton MPP Julian Reed, Halton Regional Chairman Ric Morrow, Mayor of Milton Don Gordon and their wives were introduced to the gathering.

After lunch, some of the women were taken shopping in Eden Mills while most of the men attended a brief business session at Mohawk Inn, Campbellville.

Buses took the party to Stratford, for the performance of "As You Like It" and dinner at the Church Restaurant that evening.

Business sessions were held in Toronto Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. It was the fifth time provincial ombudsmen have held an annual meeting.

Delegates were present from British Columbia, where the legislature is currently considering establishing an Ombudsman's office. Gard Gordon, Attorney General of BC, took part in a panel program. Federal authorities were also invited. Inger Hansen, the federal Correctional Investigator, attended the sessions with staff members.

During the week the delegates visited the Ontario

BUSINESS SESSION during the Ombudsman's Conference was held Wednesday afternoon at Mohawk Inn in Campbellville. It followed a luncheon at Ontario Ombudsman Arthur Maloney's farm north of Campbellville and preceded a theatre party in Stratford.

Legislature, were hosted to a dinner by Metropolitan Toronto Chairman Paul Godfrey, toured Hart House at University of Toronto, enjoyed dinners with Premier William Davis and Lieutenant-Governor Pauline McGibbon, and heard several excellent guest speakers and panel debates.

Mr. Maloney gave the closing address on Friday.

Theme of this year's conference was "The Ombudsman Plan, An Extension of Democracy". Among the guests was Sir Barnett Cocks of London, England, former Clerk of the House of Commons, Westminster. He had given the keynote address at the Monday session in Toronto.

Also registered for the conference was Frank Flavin, the Ombudsman of Alaska along with observers from other parts of the world. Mr. Flavin proposed, during

the Wednesday business meeting, that a North American Association of Ombudsmen be formed to include the Canadians, Americans, plus Trinidad and Jamaica. The US Association of Ombudsmen was just formed last August, he said. He also proposed a joint North American conference be held, perhaps every three years.

Dr. Randall Ivany, the Ombudsman for Alberta, was asked to pursue the North American organization with Mr. Flavin and report to the 1978 Canadian conference, to be held in Winnipeg - subject to the approval of the new Manitoba government which

will be elected in October.

Wednesday's conference also heard a report from Dr. Ivany and Mr. Maloney on their attendance at the International Ombudsman's Association steering committee meeting in Paris, in May. Plans are being made for the next international gathering in Jerusalem in the fall of 1980 and the theme will be "The Ombudsman as Mediator, Fighter and Reformer."

The University of Alberta's faculty of law has set up an Ombudsman's Institute to serve Canada's Ombudsmen with information, programs, scholarships and grants.

Wants to add two councillors

Consideration should be given to adding two more councillors from the urban area, Councillor Rose Harrison told Milton Council this week. She proposed a notice of motion to that effect, but asked for more statistics from staff before the subject is fully debated at next week's council meeting.

At present Milton has five councillors representing urban Milton and five covering the rural areas. Mayor Don Gordon, who lives in rural Ward One, was elected at large. Council recently approved a change in the ward boundaries, which lumps the former north Burlington area with Oakville. It was formerly with Nassagaweya.

Councillor Harrison said she wanted projections of the town's representation by population for 1979 and 1980, the current assessment of each ward, figures on the 1973

and 1976 ratios and some idea of how other municipalities split their rural and urban seats, for next week's discussion.

A suggestion the staff comment on the best way to realign the council seats was shot down by Councillor Russ Powadluk, who said that was not within the staff's jurisdiction. Others agreed.

Councillor Rick Day also wants a map showing where each member of council lives. Councillor Harrison said she wasn't thinking about dividing urban Milton into wards, as Councillor Day had implied in his request for a residence map. Ending the brief discussion, Councillor Day said council should not forget the provincial government has slated a city of 250,000 people in Ward One, and he would like that included in any population counts. "How many representatives would that give my ward?" he wondered.

EXPLANATORY NOTES RE RESTRICTED AREA BY-LAW AMENDMENT APPEAL AND OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT REFERRAL

The existing restricted area by-law permits Agriculture and Open Space uses on the subject lands. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto as shown on the draft schedule attached to the proposed by-law.

The existing official plan designation of the subject lands is Rural, Recreational-Conservation, Hazard Lands and Special Policy Area. The purpose and effect of the proposed amendment is to permit the construction, operation and maintenance by Ontario Hydro of high voltage transmission lines and uses incidental thereto within the corridors shown on the map attached to the draft official plan amendment.

The proposed official plan amendment corresponds with amendments contained in the restricted area by-law amendment appeal.
